Berlin, May 10, N. S.

WE hear from Koningsberg, that M. Poccey is there as well as Count Tarlo. The Russians were not got into Warmia as it was reported, but they were drawing a great Body together at Ortelsburg, on the Frontiers; which had obliged M. Poccey and the Troops under him, to disperse themselves in great Hurry and Confusion, every one shifting for himself as well as he could.

Hambourg, May 13, N. S. The Dutchess Dowager of East Friesland, Sister to the Queen of Denmark, is expected this Evening at Altena, to which Place the King of Denmark has sent a Gentleman of his Bed-Chamber, with a suitable Retinue, to attend her Highness and conduct her to Copenhagen, where it is believed she will reside for the future.

Hague, May 17, N. S. The States of the Province of Holland continue their Assembly, tho' it was thought that on Account of the Indisposition of the Pensionary they would have separated last Saturday. To Day Orders were issued for the Detachments which are to attend his Britannick Majesty in his Passage through the Dominions of this State on his way to Hanover, to hold themselves in Readiness at the respective Places assigned them. The Prince of Orange and the Princess Royal propose to make a Tour next Friday to view some Country Seats towards Harlem. Don Louis da Cunha, Minister of Portugal, having lately made some Instances to the States, their High Mightinesses Resolution in answer thereto was Yesterday delivered to him.

Whereas on the 18th of April last, Mr. Newby, Collector of His Majesty's Customs at Woodbridge in Suffolk, having received Information of some Tea being lodged in a House in Seymour near Hadleighs did with the Assistance of another Officer of the Customs, and a Serjeant and three Dragoons, seize in an Almshouse Ten Bags containing near Four Hundred Weight of Tea, which he secured at the Excise Office at Hadleigh that Night: And as he was carrying the same the next Day to the Custom-house at Ipswich, they were attacked on the Road about a Mile from Hadleigh, by above Twenty Persons on Horseback, who were all armed with Blunderbusses, Fowling Pieces, Pistols, and other Weapons, fired on the Officers and Dragoons, carried away the Tea, and shot William Cam, one of the Dragoons, in the Shoulder; of which Wound he died the next Day; and wounded the

Serjeant and two other Dragoons, killed two of their Horses, and wounded another.— And it appearing upon Oath, that William Neale and John Harvey of Bowford, Henry Clarke of Hintlesham, Miller; William Ruffell of Seamar, Benjamin Wisberell of Seamar, Yeoman; Benedictus Posford of Seamar; William Posford of Seamar; Samuel Leman of Bildeston, Comber; William Cock of Hadleigh, Locksmith; John Ranson of Hintlesham, Blacksmith; James Ponder of Monks Eleigh, Samuel Gallant of the same, and others were acting in the said Murder and Rescue. — His Majesty is pleased to promise His most Gracious Pardon to any two of the Persons concerned, (except the said Neale and Harvey, or the said Clarke, who it is supposed kill'd the said Cam, or the Person who if shall appear did actually kill him) in Case they shall be the Means of apprehending any of the other Offenders beforementioned, or shall discover and apprehend any of the Offenders, whose Names are not here named, so as that they or any of them shall be convicted of the Murder. — And for a further Encouragement for such Discovery, and for apprehending the Offenders, His Majesty is pleased to promise a Reward of One Hundred Pounds each, for apprehending the said William Neale, John Harvey, and Henry Clarke, or either of them; and Fifty Pounds each for apprehending the said William Ruffell, Benjamin Wisberell, Benedictus Posford, William Posford, Samuel Leman, William Cock, John Ranson, James Ponder, and Samuel Gallant, or any of the rest of the Offenders, so as that they be convicted of the Murder, to be paid by the Receiver General of the Customs.
