ON Sunday last, about Six in the Evening, his Highness Prince William of Hesse, and his Son Prince Frederick, arrived here, and immediately waited on his Majesty at Herrenhausen: Their Highnesses are lodged at a House, which is by the King's Order always in a Readiness for the Reception of foreign Princes, and are attended by the Officers and Servants of his Majesty's Household. The same Day M. Hop, Envoy Extraordinary from the States General, arrived here from England. Yesterday his Majesty, accompanied by their Highnesses, and attended by the Regency, the Rt. Hon. the Lord Harrington, the foreign Ministers, and a great Number of Persons of Distinction, went in a Chaise from Herrenhausen to a Plain called the Ecker Camp, about five English Miles distant from this Place, and reviewed Melville's, Campen's, Behr's, and Bothmer's Regiments of Foot: And this Morning those of Schwaan, Sommerfeldt, Durchleben, and Monroy, passed in Review before his Majesty. Tomorrow his Majesty intends to review the Royal Regiment of Horse Guards (commonly called the Lieb Regiment) and Colonel Hafberg's, and Hammerstein's Regiments of Horse; and on Thursday Brigadier Wendtz's, and the late Brigadier Lowe's Regiments of Dragoons. His Majesty will rest on the 24th, and on Saturday the 25th he designs to take a general Review of the whole, together with the Regiments of Horse and Foot Guards.
