**T**HE Letters from the Army of the Allies of the 11th Instant import, that all the Troops were settled in the several Quarters assigned them in the Upper and Lower Mantuan. The same Letters advise, that Count Konigsegg having left Part of the Imperial Troops to defend the narrow Passes at the Entrance into the Trentin, had marched with the rest into Tyrol: From whence it was reported he was to repair to Vienna. The Imperial and French Armies on the Rhine, continue to observe each other. 'Tis advised from Palermo the 28th past, that Syracuse and Trapani being reduced to the Obedience of Don Carlos, the Ceremony of that Prince's Coronation as King of Sicily, would be performed the Beginning of this Month. The same Day that the News came by Express to Palermo of the Surrender of Syracuse, thirty of the Nobility were declared Gentlemen of Don Carlos's Bedchamber.

The Rt. Hon. the Lords Commissioners of the Treasury having appointed Money for paying of Half Pay to Sea Officers from the 1st of January 1734, to the 30th of June, 1735, according to his late Majesty's Establishment on that Behalf; These are to give Notice, that the said Payment will begin to be made at the Treasurer of the Navy's Office in Broad-street, at Nine a-Clock in the Morning, the following Days, viz. on Tuesday the 29th of this Month for the Captains, Wednesday the 30th for the Lieutenants, and Thursday the 31st for the Masters and Surgeons, that all Persons concerned may then and there attend to receive what may become payable to them, and not only bring with them the Affidavit required, touching their not having enjoyed the Benefit of any publick Employment, either at Sea or on Shore, during the Time they are to be paid the said Half Pay, but also produce Certificates that they have subscribed to the Test, and taken the Oaths required by Act of Parliament to his present Majesty. And in Case any of the said Officers shall not be able to attend themselves to receive their Money, but employ Attorneys for that Purpose, that the said Attorneys may produce the like Certificates and Affidavits from the Persons they are employed by.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the better Government of the Charity for the Re-

And the Court of Assistants for Management of the said Charity do hereby give Notice, that they will meet at the Admiralty Office on Tuesday the 9th of September, at Eight of the Clock in the Morning, to receive the Claims of such Widows, as shall be qualified according to the said Rules and Orders.
