*Hanover, September 28, N. S.*

**O**N the 21<sup>st</sup> the King came from Herenhausen to this Place, where his Majesty intends to reside till his Departure for England. On the 22<sup>d</sup> the King took a general Review of the two Regiments of Horse, one Regiment of Dragoons, and five Regiments of Foot, which were some Time ago ordered to come into this Neighbourhood for that Purpose. On the 23<sup>d</sup> the two Regiments of Horse, and that of Dragoons passed in Review separately before the King, went through their Evolutions on Horleback, dismounted, formed into Battalions, performed their Exercise and Firings, remounted, and marched by his Majesty in Squadrons. On the 24<sup>th</sup> the King reviewed the five Regiments of Foot also separately, which performed their Exercise, Evolutions and Firings; after which they drew up in a Line, and marched by his Majesty in Divisions. His Majesty was extremely well pleased with the fine Appearance the several Regiments made, and with the exact and regular Performance of their Exercises. The Count de Seinsheim, Minister of State of the Elector of Bavaria, and his Envoy Extraordinary to the King, having, on the 25<sup>th</sup>, obtained his Audience of Leave of his Majesty, set out the next Morning on his Return to Munich; as did also the Baron de Haaslang, Chamberlain of the said Elector, who had accompanied the said Count de Seinsheim hither. On the 26<sup>th</sup> M. de Hammerstein, Privy Councillor of the Elector of Cologne, and his Envoy at this Court, delivered his Credential Letters, and was admitted to an Audience of his Majesty. The same Day the Troops which had been reviewed by his Majesty in this Neighbourhood, set out on their Return to their former respective Quarters.

*Paris, Sept. 28, N. S.* Letters from Italy bring an Account, that the French Troops had seized in the Venetian Territories 300000 Rations of Hay, and 60000 Sacks of Corn, which were designed for the Imperial Army; at which Proceeding the Venetians are very uneasy, and have resolved to make the strongest Representations against it.

*Hague, Sept. 30, N. S.* The States of Holland separated on the 24<sup>th</sup> Instant, and have appointed to meet again on the 5<sup>th</sup> of next Month. It is confirmed that Orders are come to Brussels for providing Quarters for 40000 Imperialists in the Austrian Netherlands, and that the necessary Dispositions are actually making accordingly.
