**O**N the 2d Instant, Everard Fawkener, Esq; whom the King has been pleased to appoint his Ambassador to the Ottoman Port, arrived here from England; and Yesterday his Majesty conferred on him the Honour of Knighthood: The said Ambassador is preparing to set out in a Day or two from hence for Vienna, in his Way to Constantinople.

*Hague, Oct. 7, N. S.* The States of Holland are now assembled, and are likely to continue their Session till the End of next Week. The Duke of Modena deferred till Yesterday his Departure for Calais: He went in a Yacht from Delft for Antwerp. According to our Advices from the Rhine, Count Seckendorff set out from Mentz the first of this Month, taking his March with the Body of Troops he commands towards Coblentz: The Count de Belleisle, with a strong Detachment of French Troops, was also in Motion to observe him.

Dublin Castle, September 24.

This Day arrived his Grace the Duke of Dorset, Lord Lieutenant of this Kingdom. His Grace was received at his Landing by their Excellencies the Lords Justices, and by the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Sheriffs of Dublin. The Foot Forces in Garrison, with the Militia of the City, lined the Streets through which his Grace (attended by a Regiment of Horse, the Battle-Axe Guards, and the other Officers attending the State) proceeded, amidst the Acclamations of a vast Concourse of People, to the Castle: Upon which the great Guns at the Barracks were fired, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments on Duty which were drawn out

upon College-Green; and his Grace received the Compliments of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction, upon his safe Arrival in this Kingdom.

Whitehall, Aug. 29, 1735.

Whereas two anonymous Letters were lately sent to Mr. John Kerr, in Norris-street in the Hay-market, requiring him to lay Ten Pounds in a certain Place, and at the Time therein mentioned, and threatening, in case of Noncompliance, to burn his House, and to kill the first Person who should come out of his said House: And whereas on Tuesday last, the 26th Instant, in the Night-time, the House of Mr. Nicholas Read, Haberdasher, at the Corner of the same Street, in the Hay-market, was attempted to be burnt, by putting Rags and Paper under the Door, and setting them on Fire by a Train of Gunpowder, which burnt Part of the Floor and Shop Door: Her Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Person or Persons concerned in the said Crimes, is pleased to promise her most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his or her Accomplice or Accomplices in either of the said Crimes, so as they, or any of them, may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And as a further Encouragement, the said John Kerr doth hereby promise a Reward of Ten Pounds to any Person or Persons, who shall discover the Person or Persons who sent the said Letters: And the said Nicholas Read doth also hereby promise a Reward of Twenty Pounds to any Person or Persons who shall discover the Person or Persons who attempted to burn his House: The said respective Sums to be paid by them upon the Conviction of the said Offenders, or any of them.

Stamp-Office, Sept. 27, 1735.

Whereas a Bill of Indictment was (at the last Assizes held for the County of Lancaster) found against Robert Whitworth, of Manchester, for uttering Counterfeit Stamp Paper, to which he pleaded Guilty; and whereas Joshua Dean was at the last Sessions at the Old Bayley, convicted of impressing Paper with Counterfeit Stamps; and the Commissioners for managing His Majesty's Stamp Duties having discover'd that great Quantities of Paper stamp'd with counterfeit Stamps of several Denominations, have been lately vend'd by the above-mentioned Offenders and their Accomplices, (several Parcels whereof have been by the Persons to whom they were sold, sent to this Office;) and there being great Reason to apprehend, that there may yet remain in the Custody of other Persons some of those counterfeit Stamps; the Commissioners have thought it requisite to caution all Persons against Selling any such counterfeit Stamp Paper, for preventing the Danger they will thereby incur, and to require their sending the same to this Office forthwith to be cancell'd, such counterfeit Stamps being of no Value or Use, by Reason the Deeds, Instruments, or Writings written thereon are not valid in Law or Equity; the Stamps which have been discover'd to be counterfeit, are Double Penny Stamps, Double Sixpenny, Treble Sixpenny, One Shilling, and Two Shillings and Three Penny Stamps.
