HIS Prussian Majesty is expected in Town next Tuesday; the Ten Thousand Prussians lately arrived from the Rhine, have received fresh Orders to proceed, after three Days Halt, on their March towards their old Quarters in Prussia. They talk here that Count Seckendorff is to return to his Ministerial Functions at this Court, towards the Beginning of next Year. M. d'Aylva has left this Place on his Return Home, and, in all Appearance very well satisfied with the Dispositions in which he found the King and Ministers here towards the Prince of Orange his Master.

Hague, Dec. 2, N. S. The States of Holland at present assembled have ordered the Scheme of the Lottery for raising Three Millions of Florins to be published. The Envoy from the Emperour received Yesterday an Expres from Vienna, who brought him the Preliminary Articles of Peace between his Imperial Majesty and the French King. It is advised from Italy by Letters of the 16th of last Month, that the Cessation of Hostilities was that Day to be proclaimed at the Head of the Imperial and French Troops: But that the Spanish Generals had not yet received Orders to conform thereto:
