Copenhagen, February 11, N. S.

COUNT Wartenleben, who has quitted the Prussian Service, is arrived here, and has been very graciously received by the King of Denmark. He was admitted to an Audience of his Danish Majesty alone, and has dined since at his Majesty's Table, as well as at that of the Prince Royal. He seems designed for some Employment of Trust, and it is not unlikely that he may succeed General Schulembourg in the Post of Envoy at the French Court. There is the greatest Probability that the King of Denmark will take a Progress this Summer into Holstein, both to review his Troops at their Return from the Rhine, and to reconduct the Princess Dowager of Oostfrie some Part of the Way on her Return to Aurich.

Hague, Feb. 17, N. S. The States of Holland are summoned to meet on Wednesday next, on Occasion, as 'tis said, of the Declarations sent by M. Bruyninx from Vienna, of the Emperour and the French King on the Part of his Catholick Majesty, relating to the Preliminaries of Peace; and also to take further into Consideration the Affair relating to the Succession of Juliers and Bergue. Thirteen Ships of our East India Fleet having lately failed for the Indies, met with a Storm, seven of them are returned to the Texel, five continued their Course, and one was lost upon the Sand called the Haaks. The Imperial, French, and Saxon Ministers made publick Entertainments on Monday and Tuesday last, on Occasion of the Marriage between the Duke of Lorraine and the Archdutchess. Prince George of Hesse Cassel is daily expected here from Cassel.
