## A PROCLAMATION,

For putting in Execution the Laws made to prevent lumults and riotous Affemblies, and for the more effectual punishing wicked and evil-difposed Persons going armed in dif-guise; and for punishing such Persons as shall willfully and maliciously pull down or destroy Turnpikes for repairing High-ways erected by Authority of Parliament, and for apprehending and bringing to Juftice the Perfons, who in September last were concerned in pulling down and de-firoying the Turnpikes fo erected at Led-bury, in the County of Hereford, and in attacking the Houfe of John Skipp, Efquire, one of the Justices of the Peace for the faid County; and those who have been fince Guilty of other notorious Outrages and Disturbances in the faid County of Hereford.

GEORGER. THEREAS it hath been reprefented to us, that feveral ill defigning and diforderly Perfons, having their Faces blacked, and being difguiled, and being armed with Fire Arms, and other offenfive Weapons, did, upon the Twen-tieth and Twenty first Days of September last, affemble themfelves together in a riotous and tumultuous Manner at Ledbury, in our County of Hereford, and cut down and deftroyed feveral of the Turnpikes for repairing the Highways erected by Authority of Parliament, in or near the faid Town of Ledbury, and made Publick and open Declaration, that they would not fuffer any Turnpikes to be erected in or near the faid Town of Ledbury, and that if any of the Commissioners should attempt to fet up the Turnpikes again, they would pull down their Houses, and would cut down the Turnpikes, as often as they fhould be fet up : And whereas great Num-bers of the faid Rioters and diforderly Perfons did afterwards, on the faid Twenty first Day of September, make an attack upon the Houle of John Skipp, Efquire, one of our Juffices of the Peace for our faid County of Hereford, who had fecured in his Houfe two of the faid Rioters taken in the Fact and difguifed, in order to bring them to Juffice, Juffices of the Peace, or by any of the Off and threatned to pull down or fire his Houle, ficers therein mentioned, by Proclamational

if the faid two Rioters were not immediately delivered up to them : And whereas feveral Guns were fired by the faid Rioters against the Perfons defending the faid House, and in the faid Attack leveral Perfons were wounded on both Sides, and one of the Rioters was actually killed: And whereas it hath been likewife reprefented to us, That the Perfons concerned in the faid Riots, and feveral others of their Abettors, have at feve-ral times fince affembled themfelves together in a riotous and diforderly Manner in our faid County of Hereford, and have threatned to burn and deftroy the Houles, and to take away the Lives of the faid Mr. Skipp, and fuch others of our Juffices of the Peace, as fhould dare to put the Laws in Execution against them; and that upon the first Day of December last great Numbers of the faid Rioters made an attack upon Thomas Ire-land, the Keeper of the County Goal of Hereford, treated him in a very barbarous Manner, and compelled him by blows and threats, in order to fave his Life, to fign a Difcharge to the Turnkey of the faid Coun-ly Goal, to fet the two Rioters at Liberty, who were fo taken into Cuftody as aforefaid, and afterwards robbed him of his Money: And whereas fuch Attempts to remove and deftroy Turnpikes in general are by the Laws of this Kingdom High Treason; and thole who are guilty of fuch other outragious and riotous Practices as are herein before fpe-cified, and who fet themfelves up in Defiance of the Publick Juffice of the Nation, and who threaten to kill and deftroy all Magistrates, and others, who shall endea-vour to put the Laws in Execution against them, are liable by the Common Law of this Kingdom to very great and fevere Punifhments. And whereas by an Act of Parliament made in the First Year of the Reign of our Royal Father his late Majefty King George the Firft, of glorious Memory, intituled, An Act for preventing Tumults and riotous Affemblies, and for the more fpeedy and effectual punishing the Rioters, It is enacted, That if any Perfons, to the Number of Twelve or more, being unlawfully, riotoufly, and tumultuouf-ly affembled together to the Diffurbance of the Dublick Perce, and being any ind the Publick Peace, and being required or commanded by any one or more Justice or

be made in the King's Name, in the Form hereafter to be made, for that Purpole, or any by the faid Act directed to difperfe themfelves, and peaceably to depart to their Habitations, shall, to the Number of Twelve or more, remain and continue together for the space of one Hour after such Proclamation inade, then fuch continuing together shall be adjudged Felony without Benefit of the Clergy; and the Offenders shall suffer Death without Benefit of Clergy: And whereas by another Act passed in the Ninth Year of the Reign of his faid late Majefty King George the First, intitled, An Act for the more effectual punishing wicked and evil disposed Persons going armed in Disguise, and doing Injuries and Violences to the Perfons and Properties of his Majefty's Subjects, and for the more fpeedy bringing the Offenders to Juffice, It is enacted amongst other things, That if any Perfon or Perfons being armed with Swords, Fire Arms, or other offenfive Weapons, and having his or their Faces blacked, or being otherwife dif- Junwarily fubject themfelves to the very heavy guised, shall appear in any Forest, Chase, Penalties thereby inflicted : We have thought Park, &c, or in any high Road, open Heath, fit, with the Advice of our Privy Council, to Common, or Down, or fhall cut down and deftroy any Trees planted in any Avenue, or growing in any Garden, Orchard, or Plantation, for Ornament, Shelter, or Profit, or shall fet Fire to any Houle, Barn, or Out-houle, or to any Hovel, Cock, Mow, or Stack of Corn, Straw, Hay, or Wood, or fhall wilfully and malicioufly fhoot at any Perfon in any Dwelling-houfe, or other Place, or fhall forcibly refcue any Perfon, being lawfully in Cuftody of any Officer, or other Person, for any of the Offences aforelaid, every Perfon fo of-fending, being thereof lawfully convicted, fhall be adjudged guilty of Felony, and fhall fuffer Death without Benefit of Clergy ; which faid last mentioned Act is continued, and now in Force : And whereas by an Act of Parlia-ment made in the Eighth Year of our Reign, intituled, An Act for rendering the Laws more effectual for punishing fuch Perfons as fhall wilfully and malicioufly pull down or deftroy Turnpikes for repairing Highways, or Locks, or other Works, erected by Act of Parliament, for making Rivers navigable, and for other Purposes therein mentioned, it is amongft other things enacted, That if any Perfon or Perfons whatfoever, from and after the Fifteenth Day of May, in the Year of our Lord One thousand seven hundred and thirty five, shall, either by Day or Night, wilfully or malicioufly pull down, cut down, pluck up, tbrow down, level or otherwife deftroy any Turnpike Gate or Turnpike Gates, or any Poft or Posts, Rail or Rails, Wall or Walls, or any Chain, Bar, or other Fence or Fences belonging to any such Turnpike Gate or Turnpike Gates, or any other Chain, Bar, or Fence of any Kind whatfoever, fet up or erected, or March next, difcover any other Perfon or hareafter to be fet up or erected, to prevent Perfons who hath or have been guilty of any

Houle or Houles, erected or to be erected for the Ule of any Turnpike Gate or Turnpike Gates, or forcibly relicue any Perfon or Perfons, being lawfully in Cuftody of any Officer or other Perfon, for any of the Offences before mentioned; that then, and in any of the faid Cafes, every Perfon fo offending, being thereof lawfully convicted, fhall be adjudged guilty of Felony, and fhall fuffer Death as in Cafes of Felony, without Benefit of Clergy: We therefore, being deeply fentible of the many milchievous Confequences which muft inevitably enfue to the Peace of this our Kingdom, and the Properties of our loving Subjects, from fuch wicked and deteftable Practices as have been of late committed in our. faid County of Hereford, are firmly refolved to caufe the faid Laws to be effectually put in Execution; and being defirous, out of our fatherly Tenderness to our People, that none of them should be ignorant of the same, nor isfue this our Royal Proclamation, and do hereby firicitly command, that no Perfon or Perfons whatfoever do prefume to commit or attempt any Act, Matter, or Thing whatfoever, contrary to the faid Laws, and the true Intent and Meaning thereof : And that the faid Laws be punctually observed and kept, upon Pain of the several Penalties by the faid Laws inflicted upon Offenders against the And whereas the Names of feveral of fame. the Perfons concerned in the aforefaid wicked and detestable Practices have been already difcovered, in order that they and the reft of the Perfons therein concerned may receive fuch exemplary Punishment as their Crimes justly deferve ; we do further strictly command and require all our Justices of the Peace, Sheriffs, Under Sheriffs, and Civil Officers whatfoever, and all other our Subjects, that they do use their utmost Endeavours to discover and apprehend all fuch Perfons as have been or shall be guilty of, or any wife con-cerned in, any of the Offences before mentioned, and that they do effectually put the faid Laws in Execution. And in order to put a Stop to fuch wicked and abominable Practices, We do hereby promile and declare, that if any Perfon or Perfons concerned in any of the Offences before mentioned which are capital, shall, before the Tenth Day of March next, difcover any other Perfon or Perfons who hath or have been guilty of any of the faid capital Offences, upon or fince the faid Twentieth Day of September last, or if any Perfon or Perfons concerned in any of the Offences before mentioned which are not capital, shall, before the faid Tenth Day of Passengers from pailing by without paying of the Offences herein before mentioned any Toll laid and directed to be paid by any (whether capital or not) upon or fince the Act or Acts of Parliament already made, or faid Twentieth Day of September 1aft, fo as the

the Person or Persons so discovered, may be apprehended and convicted of the faid Offences, luch Difcoverer or Difcoverers shall have our most gracious Pardon; and as a further Encouragement to the Discovery of such notorious Offenders, We do hereby promife and declare, That any Person or Persons, who fhall, before the faid Tenth Day of March next, difcover and apprehend, or caufe to be difcovered and apprehended, William Bithell, of Ledbury, Labourer, Elizabeth Walters, Servant to William Jones of the Noverings, in the Parish of Bosbury, in the faid County of Hereford, Richard Price of Ledbury aforefaid, Carpenter, Thomas Bunting, late Servant to William Smith of Ash, near Ross, Thomas Arnold and William Carrier, two other Servants, who are faid to have lived with William Smith of Wilton, near Rofs, \_\_\_\_\_ Jones, a Servant of Mrs. Abrahall of Ingeston, John Powell, a Husbandman, who uled to work for the late Mrs. Vaughan of Baysham in King's Caple, Thomas Phillips, a Welchman, faid to be a Bailiff in Husbandry to Thomas Symonds, Elq; and Thomas Wellings, supposed to be a Bargeman, or any other Perfon or Perfons who was or were guilty of pulling down or deftroying the faid Turnpikes, or any of them, fo erected by Authority of Parliament, or who was or were concerned in the faid Attack made on the faid Mr. Skipp's Houfe, in order to refcue the Perfons therein fecured, or who was or were concerned in the faid Attack made upon the Goaler of our faid County of Hereford, or who hath or have threatened to burn and deftroy any Houfes or Buildings in our faid County of Hereford, or who hath or have threatned to take away the Lives, or to do any other bodily Harm to the faid Mr. Skipp, or any other of our Justices of the Peace for the faid County of Hereford, upon or fince the faid Twentieth Day of September last, fo as he, she, or they may be convicted thereof, shall have and receive for every Perfon fo difcovered, apprehended, and convicted, the Sum of One hundred Pounds, over and above all other Rewards to which the faid Perfon or Perfons may by any Act of Parliament be entitled; which faid refpective Sums the Committioners of our Treasury, or our High Treasurer of Great Britain for the Time being, are hereby directed and required to pay accordingly, without any other or further Warrant in that Behalf. And laftly, We do hereby ftrictly charge and command all our loving Subjects, that they do use their utmost Diligence and Endeavours, in their feveral Places and Stations, to find out, discover, and apprehend all such Offenders as aforesaid, upon Pain of our higheft Difpleafure.
