*Petersbourg, January 31.*

**T**HE 28th Instant being her Czariſh Majeſty's Birth-Day, it was celebrated with the greateſt Magnificence. The Czarina dined in the great Hall of the Palace under a Canopy, with the two Princeſſes, and was ſerved by her Great Officers. All the Foreign Miniſters and Ruſs Nobility dined at a large Table that went quite round the Hall, at which ſat above 200 Perſons: In the Evening there was a Ball, Illuminations, and a very fine Firework play'd off. The ſame Day her Majeſty was pleaſed to declare Prince Kourakin her Maſter of the Horſe, Lieutenant General Volensky Grand Veneur, and M. Nepleoff, who was Reſident at Conſtantinople, a Privy Counſellor.

*Warſaw, Feb. 11, N. S.* The Queen was brought to Bed the 9th Instant of a Princeſs. It is ſaid that King Auguſtus will return to Saxony about Eaſter. The Palatin of Lublin has made ſome Propoſitions to this Court on the Behalf of thoſe Gentlemen that are at Konigsberg; what they are, is as yet unknown, but it is thought they are not much reliſhed; however, he is treated with great Diſtinction.

*Berlin, Feb. 25, N. S.* On Wednesday laſt General Ginkel, Miniſter from the States General, was called to a Conference with the Pruſſian Miniſters, where they told him that the King their Maſter had, immediately after reading the Memorial he delivered to them the Monday before, ſent an Expreſs to Wezel, with Orders to releaſe the Man he had complained was liſted there, and to put under Arreſt, as ſoon as he ſhould be found out, the Officer who had committed that Violence, in order to his being puniſhed with the utmoſt Severity. It is rumoured here, that King Stanislaus was to leave Konigsberg on the 20th or 21ſt Instant, on his Return to France, and that he would paſs through Sileſia, and not through this Place, as it was reported ſome Time ago.

*Hague, March 2, N. S.* Letters from Madrid of the 19th paſt adviſe, that his Catholick Majeſty had that Day acceded to the Preliminaries of Peace.
