HE 28th Instant being her Czarish Majesty's Birth-Day, it was celebrated with the greatest Magniscence. The Czarina dined in the great Hall of the Palace under a Canopy, with the two Princesses, and was served by her Great Officers. All the Foreign Ministers and Russ Nobility dined at a large Table that went quite round the Hall, at which sat above 200 Persons: In the Evening there was a Ball, Illuminations, and a very fine Firework play'd off. The same Day her Majesty was pleased to declare Prince Kourakin her Master of the Horse, Lieutenant General Volensky Grand Veneur, and M. Nepleoss, who was Resident at Constantinople, a Privy Councellor.

Warfaw, Feb. 11, N. S. The Queen was brought to Bed the 9th Instant of a Princess. It is said that King Augustus will return to Saxony about Easter.
