THIS Court has lately received a Courier from Turkey, and another from the Borders of Persia; by the first they are informed that the Grand Signior has made the Caimacam Grand Vizier; by the latter, that Thamas Kouli Kan is at present at Derbent, and that he designs to oblige all the Princes of the Daghestan Tartars to submit to him; it is also said, that General has married the Daughter of Outmay, who is one of the chief Princes of the Daghestans, and was always a declared Enemy to this Court, even when the Czarina had her Troops in those Parts. The 17th Instant, a Courier was sent to General Lacy, who is with the Russian Troops near Prague, to inform him, that her Czarish Majesty has been pleased to promote him to the Rank of a Felt-Marshal: He is by Birth an Irishman, and is looked upon as the best Officer in this Country.

Berlin, March 17, N. S. On the 7th Instant, the King of Prussia came to Town from Potzdam; and the next Day Baron Demeradt, the Imperial Minister, and Count Althan, the Duke of Lorraine's Chamberlain, had jointly an Audience of his Prussian Majesty, in which they delivered the Notifications they were charged with from their respective Masters, of the Marriage lately celebrated between the Duke of Lorraine and the Archduchess Maria Theresa. These Gentlemen had afterwards the Honour to dine with his Prussian Majesty; and as this was the only Business which brought the King to Town, he returned to Potzdam again immediately after Dinner. Count Althan having on the 10th received an Answer to the Letter of Notification which he presented to his Prussian Majesty, together with a Present of his Prussian Majesty's Picture set with Diamonds to the Value of 2000 Dollars, set out on the 12th for Wolfenbuttel, being charged with the like Commission of Notification to that Court.

This Day the Abbot Pareti, Minister from the Duke of Modena, had his first private Audience of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales; to which he was introduced by Sir Clement Cottrell, Kt. Master of the Ceremonies.

Whitehall, March 16, 1735-6.

Whereas the Dwelling House of Thomas Teddeman, of Harbledown, in the County of Kent, Esq; was in the Night Time, between the Sixteenth and Seventeenth Days of February last past, broke open and robbed of above Three Hundred and Ninety Pounds in Money, and other Goods, by Persons unknown. adjoining to the Dwelling House of the said Thomas Teddeman, in Harbledown aforesaid, and robbed of his Money, one of which Persons shot him through his Left Arm with a Pistol, which shattered it in so terrible a Manner, that the same was forced to be cut off above the bending of the Arm in about four Hours after he was shot as aforesaid: His Majesty, for the better Discovery of the Persons concerned in either of the said Robberies, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person that shot the said John Roberts) who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as they or any of them may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
