M. Mosinsky, Treasurer of the Court, went some Days ago to have an Interview with the Great Treasurer of the Crown; till his Return it remains uncertain whether the Great Treasurer designs to come hither or not. It is currently reported here, that the Russians have actually resolved upon the Siege of Asoph; that Velt Marshal Lacy is to command it; and that Velt Marshal Munich is to command the Army of Observation. Of the 8000 Russian Troops that are in Poland, 4000 have received Orders to march towards the Ukraine. The Conferences betwixt the Russian Ministers and the Deputies of this Republick are upon a very good Footing; and 'tis hoped the Difficulties which the two principal Points have met with, the one concerning Livonia, and the other Courland, will be surmounted; the Poles having already yielded up their Pretensions of changing the Government of Courland, and dividing it into Palatinates. This Court has already given the necessary Orders for giving up the Fort of Wechselelmunde to the Town of Dantzick, and has consented to an Abatement of 100,000 Prussian Florins, being the 9th Part of the Sum which that City is obliged to pay according to its Capitulation. M. Pocey, who was Regimentary of King Stanislaus in Lithuania, arrived here Yesterday from Konigsberg, and has had his Audience of King Augustus.

Hague, April 24, N. S. M. Fabricius, one of the two Secretaries of the States of the Province of Holland, died on the 20th Instant, and there are already several Competitors for his Place, among them M. van Hoey, Ambassadour from the States General to the Court of France, who has Leave to come hither on his private Affairs. The States of Holland are to assemble To-morrow, but will not dispose of the said Place till their Session in the Month of July. The Count de Hautoyer being arrived from England, notified Yesterday to the States, the Marriage of the Duke of Lorrain with the Archduchess. On the 20th Instant the Prince of Orange, Stadholder of the Province of Groningen, with her Royal Highness his Con-

sort, made their publick Entry into the City of Groningen with great State and Magnificence, and were received by the Deputies and the Nobility of the Province, the Magistrates, and other Persons of Distinction, with all Splendor and publick Demonstrations of Joy.
