THE Right Honourable Mr. Walpole, his Britannick Majesty's Ambassadour to this State, arrived here this Morning, having landed at Schevening. The Count du Hautoy, Minister of the Duke of Lorrain, set out the 2d Instant on his Return to Nancy. The States in their Answer to the Letter from the Duke his Master, give him (for the first Time) the Title of Royal Highness. The Office of Bailiff of Dalem, which became vacant by the Death of M. d'Amerongen is fallen to M. Tamminga Deputy of Groninghen, the Deputies of the major Part of the Provinces having cast Lots for it. The States of Holland will meet on Wednesday next.

Whitehall, April 27.

The Princess Augusta, who set out from Gotha on Saturday the 17th Instant, O. S. came to Helvoetsluys the Saturday following, at Three in the Afternoon, where His Majesty's Yachts with the Convoy being arrived, and the Wind very fair, her Highness set Sail that Day about Five, and on Sunday last about Two in the Afternoon, landed safe and in perfect Health at Greenwich, having had the finest and the quickest Passage imaginable. Her Highness

came this Day from Greenwich to St. James's, where she arrived between Two and Three a-Clock in the Afternoon, and is to be married this Evening to His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales in the King's Chapel there, by the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of London.
