**T**HIS Evening the Marriage Ceremony of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales with her Highness the Princess of Saxe Gotha, was performed in the Royal Chapel at St. James's, with the greatest Magnificence and Splendour.

**W**Hereas in the Act of Uniformity which establishes the Liturgy of the Church of England, Provision is made for such Alterations in the Prayers for the Royal Family, as from Time to Time shall become necessary, and be directed by lawful Authority: — It is thereupon this Day ordered by his Majesty in Council, That in the Morning and Evening Prayers, in the Litany, and in all other Parts of the Publick Service, as well in the occasional Offices, as in the Book of Common Prayer, where the Royal Family is appointed to be particularly prayed for, The following Form and Order shall be observed, viz. *Our gracious Queen Caroline, their Royal Highnesses Frederick Prince of Wales, the Princess of Wales, the Duke, the Princesses, and all the Royal Family.*

And his Majesty doth strictly charge and command, that no Edition of the Common Prayer be from henceforth Printed, but with this Amendment; and that in the mean Time, till Copies of such Edition may be had, all Parsons, Vicars and Curates within this Realm, do (for the preventing of Mistakes) with the Pen correct and amend all such Prayers in their Church Books according to the foregoing Direction. And for the better Notice hereof, That this Order be forthwith printed and published, and sent to the several Parishes; and that the Right Reverend the Bishops do take Care that Obedience be paid to the same accordingly.

**W**Hereas by an Act made in the Tenth Year of her late Majesty Queen Anne, intituled, *An Act to prevent the disturbing those of the Episcopal Communion in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, in the Exercise of their Religious Worship, and in the Use of the Liturgy of the Church of England;* and for repealing the Act passed in the Parliament of Scotland, intituled, *Act against irregular Baptisms and Marriages,* it is enacted, That every Minister and Preacher, as well of the Established Church in that Part of Great Britain called Scotland, as those of the Episcopal Communion protected and allowed by this Act, shall at some Time during the Exercise of the Divine Service, in the respective Church, Congregation, or Assembly, pray in express Words for her most Sacred Majesty Queen Anne, and the most Excellent Princess Sophia, Electress and Dutches Dowager of Hanover, while living, and all the Royal Family: — In pursuance of the said Act, it is hereby ordered by his Majesty in Council, that henceforth every such Minister and Preacher shall, in his respective Church, Congregation, or Assembly, pray in express Words, *For his most Sacred Majesty King George, our gracious Queen Caroline, their Royal Highnesses Frederick Prince of Wales, the Princess of Wales, the Duke, the Princesses, and all the Royal Family.* — Of which all Persons concerned are hereby required to take Notice, and govern themselves accordingly.

Most gracious Sovereign,

All your Majesty's Subjects have Reason to be sensible of their Happiness under so mild and gracious a Prince; as they are in the full Possession of all their Rights and Liberties, Property secured, Commerce flourishing, Industry encouraged, Peace and Tranquility at Home and Abroad; as this their present Felicity is owing to your Majesty's Protection and Influence, and the Prospect of the Continuance of it to your Wisdom and Goodness; These your Majesty's most faithful Subjects beg leave to express their Joy and their Acknowledgements with the most grateful Hearts, and to assure your Majesty of their most dutiful and affectionate Regard to your Royal Person; of their zealous Endeavours in their Sphere for the Support of your Majesty's Government; and that they esteem themselves under the highest Obligations to do all in their Power, that your Majesty's Reign may be easy and happy to your self, as it is an inestimable Blessing to your People.

To which his Majesty was pleased to make this most gracious Answer.

*I Thank you for your Congratulations on this Occasion, and for the Zeal and Concern that you shew for the Prosperity and Support of my Family and Government.*

There is nothing to wish, but that Heaven would bestow on this Royal Pair, a Progeny in every Respect resembling those of your Majesty; and that your Majesty may have perfect Health, and live to see with Joy and Comfort all the desirable Effects of this happy Union.

Her Majesty was pleased to receive their Compliments very graciously, and they all had the Honour to kiss Her Majesty's Hand.

Then they were introduced to their Royal Highnesses the Prince and Princess of Wales, by the Rt. Hon. the Lord Baltimore, Lord of the Bedchamber to his Royal Highness; and Mr. Baron Thomson made their Compliments, first to his Royal Highness, in the following Manner.

They intreat your Royal Highness's Permission to offer their most ardent Wishes for your Royal Highness's Health and Prosperity; that you may be bless'd with a numerous Offspring, that you may have the Satisfaction to see them truly representing your Royal Highness, with the most benevolent Disposition, with the tenderest Humanity, Assertors of Liberty and Friends to Mankind, with all other those Princely Virtues which give a Lustre even to your Dignity, and which make your Royal Highness the Favourite of the People, and the hopeful Prospect of the British Nation.

*Copenhagen, May 1, N. S.* The Departure of his Danish Majesty for Holstein is fixed for To-morrow.
