WHereas in the Act of Uniformity which • eftablishes the Liturgy of the Church of England, Provision is made for fuch Alterations in the Prayers for the Royal Family, as from Time to Time thall become ne-cellary, and be directed by lawful Autho-rity: — It is thereupon this Day ordered by his Majesty in Council, That in the Morning and Evening Prayers, in the Litany, and in all other Parts of the Publick Service, as well in the occasional Offices, as in the Book of Common Prayer, where the Royal Family is appointed to be particularly prayed for, The following Form and Order shall be observed, viz. Our gracious Queen Caroline, their Royal Highneffes Frederick Prince of Wales, the Princefs of Wales, the Duke, the Princeffes, and all the Royal Family.

And his Majefty doth strictly charge and command, that no Edition of the Common Prayer be from henceforth Printed, but with this Amendment; and that in the mean Time till Copies of fuch Edition may be had, all Parfons, Vicars and Curates within this Realm, do (for the preventing of Miftakes) with the Pen correct and amend all fuch Prayers in their Church Books according to the aforegoing Direction. And for the better Notice hereof, That this Order be forthwith printed and published, and fent to the feveral Parishes; and that the Right Reverend the Bishops do take Care that Obedience be Bishops do take care paid to the fame accordingly.
