Copenhagen, August 11, N. S.

Yesterday there was a Council held at Friedensburgh, but as the King had declared his Intention of not appearing in Publick, none but the Ministry went to pay their Court. The excessive Heat of the Weather is by some given as the Reason of his Majesty's not coming out into the Circle, or dining as usual in Publick, but others think he has again felt some Return of his Distemper; the rather, because on the 9th Instant two Physicians of the Town were called in to join in a Consultation with those who constantly attend upon his Majesty. As the King of Denmark passed through the Island of Fuhnen, on his Return from Holstein, he gave Orders that the Marriage of M. Juel, one of his Majesty's Chamberlains, with the Countess Frise, should be celebrated in the Palace of Odensee; and was so gracious as to assist at the Ceremony with his whole Court.

Dresden, Aug. 11. The King and Queen arrived here from Warsaw on the 7th Instant, upon which Occasion Illuminations and publick Rejoycings have been made three Nights successively.

Berlin, Aug. 12. The King returned hither from his Progress to Prussia on the 8th Instant, and this Morning set out for Potsdam. It is said his Majesty designs to go in Person to view the Damage done by the late overflowing of the River Oder. General Ginkel, Minister from the States General of the United Provinces to this Court, having obtained their High Mightinesses Leave to take a Turn to Holland for some Months on his private Affairs, has had an Audience of Leave of his Prussian Majesty. Baron Brackel, the Russian Minister here, has this Day received by an Exprez from his Court, Advice, that Felt Marshal Count Munich has possessed himself of Bacciefaray, the Capital City of the Crimee, and of several other Places; and made no Doubt of compleating very soon the entire Conquest of the Crimee.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the better Government of the Charity for the Relief of poor Widows of Commission and War-

rant Officers of the Royal Navy: These are to give Notice to all such Widows, whose Husbands died on or since the 30th of August, 1732, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth, as also with the Clerks of the Cheque at Deptford and Woolwich, and the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale; where they may be informed of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose: But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Thomas Corbet, Esq; at the Admiralty Office, who will send them all necessary Information. And the Governors of the said Charity intending to distribute some Relief to the Widows of such Sea Officers who died before the 30th of August, 1732, and whose Circumstances come within the Rules of the Establishment; These are to give Notice to all such Widows, to repair or send to the above mentioned Places, that they may be provided with the proper Certificates, And the Court of Assistants do hereby give Notice, that they shall meet at this Office on Tuesday the 14th of September, at Eight of the Clock in the Morning, in order to receive and adjust the Claims of all such Widows as shall be qualified according to the said Rules and Orders.
