N the 20th Inftant a Courier arrived here in Eleven Days from Perecop, having been difpatch'd from thence by Felt Marshal Count Munich, with Advice, that he had marched with a ftrong Body of the Czarina's Forces from Kozelow to Bacciefaray, the late Refidence of the Cham of Tartary, and that upon the Approach of the Troops to that Town, a confiderable Body of Tartars and fome Janizaries were discovered posted before it, in order to oppose them : But those Enemies were foon routed by the Don and Saporogue Coffacks; who are a People made use of by the Ruffians to advance before their Army, and to facilitate its Marches, by difcovering any Ambufcades of the Enemy, and clearing the Ways of all Obstructions that might retard the Execution of its Deligns: Which Saporogue Coffacks having forced their Entrance into Bacciesaray, the Inhabitants whereof were fled to the Mountains, fet the Town on Fire, before General Munich could be able to prevent it. The Tartars give no Quarter to the Saporogue Coffacks, (who were formerly under the Protection of the Turks,) nor do the Saporogues give any to the Tartars. By Count Munich's Description of Bacciefaray, it must have been a fine old Town, and the Cham's Palace a magnificent Structure, built after the Eastern Manner, and adorned with Marble Fountains: It is now entirely diffroyed with the Town ; and alfo a Seat about four Miles from it, which was the Refidence of a Prince of the Cham's Family. The Tartars having deftroyed all the Forage in the Country, was the Reafon that obliged Felt Marshal Munich to return with the greatest Part of his Army to the Perecop, where it is faid he will be getting every Thing ready to undertake the Siege of Kercz or Kaffa, as foon as he fhall be join'd by feveral Thousand Tartars and Calmucks, who are marching towards the Crimea, and are to be employ'd to follow the Cham and his People in the Mountains, whither they are retired, the Ruffian regular Troops not being fo fit for that Service. Some are of Opinion', that as Count Munich is now at the Perecop, he will probably remain there till an Army is formed which may be thought fufficient to go and meet the Grand Vizier, and perhaps attack Oczakow, which is on the Weft Side of the Borifthenes or Dnieper. If the Ruffians could make themfelves Mafters of that Place, before the Arrival of the Vizier there, it would diffrefs the Turks very much, as it is the greateft Magazine they have in those Parts. The late Thamas Kouli out doing any Thing against the Turks, waiting, as it was thought, to see whether the Czarina would actually break with the Porte; and as the News of an open War be-Kan, now Sophi of Perfia, who has taken the

tween them must by this Time have reached that Sophi, this Court expects foon to hear of his taking the Field with his Army; and the Persian Ambassadour here has been promifed by them, that the Czarina will not conclude any l'eace with the Porte, unless the Sophi his Master be included therein, he having been to generous as to refute making an advantageous one with the Turks, becaufe they would not confent to include her Czarish Majesty in it.
