Copenhagen, August 18, N. S.

THE King of Denmark has kept free from any Return of his Illness for this Week past, and was present Yesterday at the Council which was held at Friedenburg; but his Majesty still avoids the Fatigue of coming out into his Circle, and of dining in Publick.

Berlin, Aug. 25, N. S. Yesterday the King of Prussia set out from Potzdam for Wulterhausen. M. Thulemeyer, who has the chief Hand in the Dispatch of Affairs at this Court, is gone to the Baths of Toplitz in Bohemia, for the Recovery of his Health. M. Pollman, the Prussian Resident at Cologne, is appointed his Prussian Majesty's Minister at the Diet of Ratisbon, in the Room of M. Danckleman; who desired some Time ago his Dismission from that Post. On Monday last the Princess Royal of Prussia removed from hence to a Country House near Rupin, the Prince Royal her Consort's Quarters, where their Royal Highnesses are chiefly to reside for the future. General Ginkel, the Dutch Minister, is still here, but designs to set out for Holland To-morrow by the Way of Cassel.

Hague, Aug. 31, N. S. His Highness Prince William of Hesse Cassel arrived here the 27th Instant in the Morning from Loo, whither he had been to wait on the Prince, and her Royal Highness the Princess, of Orange. It is said this Prince of Hesse Cassel will continue three or four Weeks at this Place, desiring to solicit the States Leave to resign, in Favour of the Prince his Son, the Command of a Regiment of Dragoons which his Highness at present has in the States Service. Since the Prince's Arrival here, he has been visited by all the Foreign Ministers and other People of the best Fashion in this Town, except the Ambassadors, who upon Point of Ceremony pretend to expect the first Visit from him. M. Imberti, Minister from the Republick of Venice, who was lately at the Court of Great Britain, but is now

come hither from England, is directed by his Masters to stay at this Place till he receives some farther Orders from them.
