**A** Few Days ago several Ship Carpenters, and a great Number of Seamen were sent from hence to Aloff, from which it is conjectured that this Court design to repair the Ships they have on the River Don, and to build others there.

*Berlin, Sept. 1, N. S.* On the 27th past in the Evening, the King of Prussia came to Town unexpectedly, and after two Days Stay, his Majesty, attended by several Ministers and Officers, went to the Banks of the Oder, to examine, himself, the Damages occasioned by the late Floods there. It is said his Prussian Majesty designs to go next Tuesday to the Prince Royal's Country House near Rupin, in order to regulate both his and his Consort's Households; and to see that their Royal Highnesses new Residence be provided with what shall be found necessary.

*Hanover, Sept. 4, N. S.* Yesterday Count Kinski took his Audience of Leave of his Majesty, and set out from hence this Morning on his Journey to Vienna. His Majesty's Departure for the Gohrde is fixed for Monday the 24th Instant.
