THE Agree seems now to have entirely left his Danish Majesty : For these eight or ten Days past he has regularly missed his rit ; and it is hoped his Majesty will soon Recover his former State of Health. King Stanislaus has been acknowledged by this Court, King of Poland, in the same Manner as other Powers have done ; and M. Berensdorff, the Danish Envoy at Dresden, has had Orders sent to him, to the same Effect with Regard to King Augustus. M. During, who was Aide de Camp to the late King of Sweden, and afterwards received his Dismissal from that Prince's Service, with the Character of Colonel ; is now come hither, with a View, as it is generally supposed, of getting into Employment here.

Vienna, Aug. 25, N. S. A Courier arrived Yesterday Morning with Letters from Count Kevenhuller of the 17th Instant, to acquaint this Court, that he had had a Conference on the 15th with M. de Noailles, and was to have another, which would be final, in a few Days ; that every thing was preparing for the Evacuation of the Milaneze gradually by the French and Piedmontese Troops, and for a like gradual and successive Entrance of the Imperialists. The King of Sardinia was for having the 30th fixed for putting the Troops into Motion ; but M. de Noailles proposed a shorter Day, and it is thought here, that the several Marches will be begun as this Day. There is Advice also by private Letters, that M. de Montemar has actually received Orders for a like Evacuation of Tuscany, in Consequence of what it is assured has been agreed upon with M. de Vaugrenant the French Minister in Spain, but Count Kevenhuller had had no Notice of it from either M. de Noailles or M. de Montemar. The long expected Courier from Muscovy, who it is supposed may bring the Resolutions of her Czarish Majesty with respect to the Terms upon which the will be willing to treat with the Turks, is not yet arrived here ; and we begin now to think, that the Muscovites will not declare their Intentions upon that Head, till they shall see what Proposals the Turks may be willing to make.

Hague, Sept. 7, N. S. The States of Holland will assemble on Wednesday next, in order to dispose of all the Civil and Military Employments that are vacant within their Province, as is usually done at this Time of

the Year. Count d'Uhlefeld, the Emperor's Minister, set out this Morning for Vienna, and will return within six Weeks, having Leave from his Court for no longer Time. M. Imberti sets out on the 9th Instant for Venice. The Prince of Orange with his Consort the Princess Royal, are expected here in a few Days.

Hanover, Sept. 4, N. S. Preparations are making here for a grand Hunting Match, which his Majesty intends to take the Diversion of, at a Place called Bahrenbruch, near Giffhorn, about five German Miles from hence, and to proceed from thence to the Gohrde.

His Majesty having been graciously pleased by his Warrant under his Royal Sign Manual, dated the 10th of June, 1733, to establish certain Rules and Orders for the better Government of the Charity for the Relief of poor Widows of Commission and War-rant Officers of the Royal Navy : These are to give Notice to all such Widows, whose Husbands died on or since the 30th of August, 1732, that Copies of the said Rules and Orders are lodged with the Commissioners of his Majesty's Navy at Chatham, Portsmouth, and Plymouth, as also with the Clerks of the Cheque at Deptford and Woolwich, and the Naval Officers at Harwich, Deal, and Kinsale ; where they may be informed of all Particulars which entitle them to the Benefit of the said Charity, and receive the proper Certificates for that Purpose : But such Widows as live at too great a Distance from the Places above-mentioned, may apply by Letter to Thomas Corbet, Esq, at the Admiralty Office, who will send them all necessary Information. And the Governors of the said Charity intending to distribute some Relief to the Widows of such Sea Officers who died before the 30th of August, 1732, and whose Circumstances come within the Rules of the Establishment ; These are to give Notice to all such Widows, to repair or send to the above-mentioned Places, that they may be provided with the proper Certificates. And the Court of Assistants do hereby give Notice, that they shall meet at this Office on Tuesday the 14th of September, at Eight of the Clock in the Morning, in order to receive and adjust the Claims of all such Widows as shall be qualified according to the said Rules and Orders.
