*Petersbourg, December 18.*

**T**HIS Court continues to make great Preparations for carrying on the War with Vigour the next Campaign. Several Thousand Seamen, and others belonging to the Navy and Admiralty, have been sent of late from hence to Tabaroff near Veronitz, and to Branska in the Ukraine, where a great Number of double Chaloupes or large Boats are building, to be employed next Spring on the Rivers Don and Dnieper; each of which Boats is to be large enough to carry about 100 Soldiers, and six Small Cannon. Till the Arrival of Field-Marshal Count Munich, who is soon expected, it is thought no Resolution will be taken, on which Side to attack the Turks in case an End is not put to the War this Winter. This being Princess Elizabeth's Birth-day, who is now enter'd into the 28th Year of her Age, in the Morning the Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, went to make their Compliments to her Highness on the Occasion; and at Night there is to be a Ball at Court.

*Hambourg, Jan. 15.* Sir Cyril Wich, Bart. his Britannick Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary to the Circle of Lower Saxony, who some Time since obtained his Majesty's Permission to make a Tour to Paris, in order to settle there some private Affairs, arrived here from thence on the 12th Instant.

*Hague, Jan. 18, N. S.* Her Royal Highness the Princess of Orange received publick Visits and Compliments to Day, for the first Time since her Lying-in, being in very good Health. There are now in the Texel 19 Ships for the East Indies, and a great Number of Merchant Ships, which have been hindered these two Months from putting to Sea by contrary Winds.

*Whitehall, January 15.*

Early this Morning Mr. Carrington, one of his Majesty's Messengers arrived at St. James's, with the agreeable News, that on

Thursday the 13th Instant, between Nine and Ten o'Clock in the Morning, the King embarked on board the Carolina Yacht, at Helvoetfluys, and immediately set Sail, in Company with all the other Yachts, for England, the Wind being then at S. W. by W. and that his Majesty landed in good Health at Leostoff in Suffolk, Yesterday at Noon; that Night his Majesty lay at Stratford in the same County, and this Morning about Six his Majesty set forward, and passing in an open Chafe through the City of London, arrived at St. James's about Two this Afternoon, (God be praised) in perfect Health. At the several Places through which his Majesty passed, the People expressed their Satisfaction at his Majesty's safe Arrival, by all possible Demonstrations of Joy; and this Evening there were Bonfires and Illuminations in the Cities of London and Westminster.
