HE Marquess de la Chetardie having been at Potzdam to communicate to his Pruffian Majesty the Sentiments of the Court of France upon the Affair of the Succession of Bergue and Juliers, returned hither the 20th Instant, and has fince had two Conserences with the Prussian Ministers. The first was to make to them the same Communication as he had done to the King their Master. In the second he laid before them some Complaints which he had received from his Court, concerning some Practices of Prussian Officers in several Provinces of France, to list Men into the Prussian Service.

Hague, Jan. 29, N. S. The Prince of Orange has deferred his Departure for Friefland to Monday or Tuesday next. He defigns to go first to Enkhuysen, and from thence to pass over to Friesland. Mr. Robinfon, his Britannick Majesty's Minister to the Court of Vienna, is expected here to Night in his Return from thence by the Way of Dresden, in order to embark for England.
