THE Court removed from hence to Friedenburg on the 16th Instant. The Ordinance for regulating Quarantine to be performed by all Ships bound to this Country from the Coast of Prussia is now published. By the Advices from Dantzick and those Parts, it appears that Misery, Famine and Fevers carry off great Numbers of People in Silesia and Poland, and even at Dantzick, and upon the Coast of Prussia, but that there is not any Plague or infectious Distemper in any of those Countries.

Hague, May 28, N. S. There is as yet no Day fixed for the Re-assembly of the States of Holland. At their last Assembly a Proposition was made on their Part to the States General, for declaring for the future, all Military Officers who shall embrace the Roman Catholick Religion, or who shall marry Roman Catholick Women, incapable of serving the State; which Proposition in all Probability will pass into a Law, seeing the great Inconveniences that result from the Officers changing their Religion, or intermarrying with Roman Catholick Women. Several Conferences have lately been held between the Deputies of the States, and the Imperial and French Ministers, upon the Succession of Bergues and Juliers. The last Letters from Vienna do not bring any Account of the Declaration of War against the Turks, but that the Manifesto was ready to be published; and that every Thing was preparing upon the Frontiers for beginning the Operations.

The Baron de Sohlenthal, Plenipotentiary from the King of Denmark, has represented, That his Master observing that there are contagious Distempers in Poland, which are spread to Dantzick, and other Towns and Ports on the Baltick, has thought fit, for preventing such Infection being brought into his Dominions, to issue an Ordinance, dated at Friedericksberg the 13th Instant, N. S. prescribing certain Rules for all Ships sailing from those Parts, with their Crews, Goods, and Passengers, how they are to behave in coming from Places suspected of Contagion to the Coast of Denmark. The said Minister has given Notice of these Orders published in Denmark, that the British Subjects who trade in the Baltick may take care to have Passes of Health, and to perform such other Matters as are directed by the aforesaid Ordinance.

His Majesty has been pleased to order a Conge d'Elire to pass the Great Seal of Great Britain, empowering the Dean and Chapter of the Cathedral Church of Bristol to elect a Bishop of that See, the same being now vacant by the Translation of the Right Reverend Father in God Thomas late Bishop thereof to the See of Oxford; and also to issue his Letters under his Majesty's Royal Sign Manual, therein naming and recommending to the said Dean and Chapter the Reverend Thomas Gooch, Doctor in Divinity, to be by them elected and chosen into the said Bishoprick of Bristol.

That nothing in this Act contained shall extend to charge with any Duty, such Wine as the Owners or Occupiers of British Vineyards shall make from the Juice of British Grapes only growing thereon.
