Whereas it has been represented to the King, That Richard Turpin did, on Wednesday the Fourth Day of May last, barbarously murder Thomas Morris, Servant to Henry Tomson, one of the Keepers of Epping Forest; and that the said Richard Turpin hath, at divers Times, committed several notorious Felonies and Robberies in and near the said Forest, and other Places near the Cities of London and Westminster; His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing the said Richard Turpin to Justice, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of the Accouplices of the said Richard Turpin, who shall discover him, so that he may be apprehended and convicted of any of the said Offences. And as a further Encouragement, his Majesty is pleased to promise a Reward of Two Hundred Pounds to any Person or Persons who shall discover the said Criminal, so as he may be apprehended and convicted as aforesaid, to be paid upon such Conviction, over and above all other Rewards to which the said Person or Persons may otherwise be entitled.
