• *Warsaw, May 16, N. S.*

**T**HE last Letters from the Frontiers of the Ukraine advise, that all the Troops which are to compose the Army under the Command of Felt Marshal Count Munich being assembled in the Neighbourhood of Czariczenka, that General had extended the same towards Perwoezna, and had at the same Time ordered a Body thereof to pass the Dnieper, and detached some Cossacks to Kritow on this Side that River. Those Letters add, that the Russian Army was posted in such a Manner as made it difficult for People to judge whether the General's Design was to go to Oczakow, as it had to this Time been reported, or whether he would turn to the Right, in order to march towards Bender: The last of which several People are induced to think that General will take, from the great Number of Provision-Waggons he has in his Army, which are said to amount to above the Number of 60,000, and which would be unnecessary if his Design was not to go from the Dnieper.

*Berlin, June 1, N. S.* The General Review which was to have been this Day, has been put off till Monday, that the Duke and Dutchess of Brunswick, who are expected here To-morrow Evening, may have an Opportunity to be present at it. His Prussian Majesty has been confined to his Chamber these two or three Days past with a Cold and a small Attack of the Gout.

*Copenhagen, June 1, N. S.* The Margravine continues very ill since her two late Fits, and complains chiefly of a great Oppression upon her Lungs. Those of her Court say she grows better; but it is generally thought that these Fits have shaken her Constitution too much, considering her Age, to leave a reasonable Hope of her Recovery. The Precautions taken here to keep off Infection, appears daily more and more necessary; for though all the Seafaring People from the Coast of Prussia absolutely deny that there is any contagious Distemper in those Parts, yet by the last Mortuary Bill which has been received from Dantzick, it is evident that 560 Persons died there in one Week. This is so vastly above the ordinary Number, that considering the Neighbourhood of Poland, where the Sicknes is generally

agreed to be infectious, it may well be looked upon as a dangerous Symptom, and justly alarm all Nations who have any Intercourse with that City, but more especially Denmark, where most People remember the great Havock made by a Plague brought from Dantzick. A Flute from Petersbourg bound for Archangel lies now in this Road; but having no Certificate of Health, the Crew are not permitted to come on Shore, and Commissioners are gone out this Day to examine what Condition they are in.
