THE Russian Flute is gone from hence towards the North Sea. She stopped here to take in fresh Water, which after some Consideration was permitted; the Precautions against the Sickness not being meant to affect all Ships coming from the Baltick, but only those from Dantzick, Königsberg, and the neighbouring Ports. Since the last Post the Margravine has had a Feverish Indisposition, which it was apprehended her Disorder would turn to. Her Illness seems to increase, so that a Journey which their Danish Majesties intended to have taken this Week to Wallae, has been put off on that Account; yet as she is only attended by a Physician of the Court, no extraordinary Assistance being called in from the Town, the Danger is not thought to be extreme.

Dresden, June 5, N. S. Some Days ago a Messenger arrived from Constantinople, sent by M. Stadnicki, the Polish Minister at the Ottoman Porte, with the News of his having been admitted to an Audience of the Sultan; and that the Porte have resolved to send a Minister to compliment our Elector upon his Accession to the Crown of Poland. A Messenger is also lately arrived here with a Letter from M. Tahlman, the Imperial Minister, wherein he desires, in the Name of the Emperor, his Polish Majesty's Leave, that the Plenipotentiaries appointed for the treating of a Peace between the Turks and Russians may hold their Congress at Niemierow in the Palatinate of Podolia, the Turks having already agreed to it. M. Tahlman's Letter presses a speedy Consent on the Part of this Court, which is look'd upon as a Mark that both the Turks and the

Emperor are inclined to Peace. According to the last Letters from the Ukraine, the Siege of Oczakow, which was talked of two Months ago, is not yet begun; but the Russians are on their March, have passed the Borysthenes, and are going to form the Blockade of the said Town.

Hague, June 11, N. S. Count Uhlefeld, the Emperour's Minister here, has lately delivered to the States General a Memorial, wherein he very earnestly presses them to regulate the Commerce of these Provinces with the Austrian Low Countries by settling a new Tariff. The States of Holland are to assemble To-morrow, probably to deliberate thereupon. M. Van Hoey is expected here the latter End of this Week from Paris:
