ON the 17th Instant the States of Holland separated. On the 19th his Excellency Mr. Walpole delivered to the States General a Letter from the King his Master, notifying the happy Delivery of the Princess of Wales, and the Birth of a Princess; and the next Day their High Mightinesses sent Deputies to make their Compliments to his Excellency on that Occasion. Some East India Ships are arrived in the Texel, and the rest of the Fleet from thence are daily expected in our Ports. M. Vander Meer, Ambassador of the States in Spain, has Leave given him to make a Journey to Holland on his private Affairs, and is expected here next Week. Since the first Accounts that came of the taking of Oczakow and Nissa, we have received no farther Particulars of those Successes.
