Petersbourg, December 10.

LAST Wednesday, the 7th Instant, being the Birth-day of Princess Anne, who then entered into the Twentieth Year of her Age, all the Foreign Ministers and Russian Nobility waited on her Highness in the Morning to make their Compliments, after which they dined at Court, and at Night there was a Ball. The 9th being the same Princess's Name-day, they had again the Honour in the Morning to make her their Compliments, and were invited to sup at Court, where there was a Ball. Felt Marshal Count Lacy arrived here on the 3d Instant; and Felt Marshal Count Munich is daily expected.

Copenhagen, Jan. 4, N. S. Upon New-Year's Day, Lieutenant General Schulemberg, his Danish Majesty's Envoy to the Court of France, was declared General of the Horse, in the Room of General Morner, who had desired his Dismissal; and at the same time M. Flelsen, one of the King of Denmark's Chamberlains, was appointed Grand Master of the Queen's Court. Two or three other Promotions were then made in the military Way, but of little Note.

Dresden, Jan. 8, N. S. By a Messenger who arrived here the 1st Instant from Rome, the King has received the News of the Bishop of Cracow's being made Cardinal, thro' his Intercession. It is reported, that General Baudits who has commanded the Saxon Troops as the Senior General since the Prince of Wiefenfels quitted, is to retire from hence, but to preserve his Pension; and Count Sulkowski it is said will be made Felt Marshal to the Emperor, and have the Command in Chief of the Saxon Troops. the Russian Minister, arrived here last Night from Dantzick. Count Rutowski and the Chevalier de Saxe are arrived here from Caskaw, and the King received them in a Manner that sufficiently marked how much he was pleased with their Conduct. M. Ozakowski seems to stand fair for the Charge of Great Treasurer of Poland; as he still remains attached to the Family of Czar-toriski, he will by their Means get the Recommendation of the Court of Russia, which will be a great Help to him.
