WHEREAS His Majesty has signified unto us His Royal Pleasure, That the Parliament of this Kingdom, which now stands prorogued to Tuesday the Twenty-fifth Day of this Instant April, be further prorogued to Thursday the Twenty-first Day of December next; We do therefore publish and declare, That the said Parliament be, and accordingly the said Parliament is, hereby further prorogued to Thursday the Twenty-first Day of December next: Whereof the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Commons in this present Parliament, are to take Notice accordingly.

God Save the King:

Petersbourg, April 1. The Emperour's Ministers have used their best Endeavours for some Weeks past, but without Success, to engage the Czarina to persuade the King of Poland to leave the 8000 Men he has in Hungary, on the same Footing they were first sent. When General Botta (who set out from hence last Monday) had his Audience of Leave, her Majesty was pleased to make him a Present of a Diamond Ring, valued at about 4 or 5000 Rubles.

Berlin, April 22, N. S. Orders are made out for the Troops who are to march towards Cleves. This Route goes no further than Magdebourg, because 'tis said these Troops are to encamp in that Neighbourhood, at a Place called Ziesar, where they are to receive further Orders. When these Troops are to begin their March, does not seem to be yet determined; but 'tis thought it will be sooner or later, as this Court may see more or less Appearance of the Prince of Sultzbach's being confirmed in the Provisional Possession of the Provinces in Dispute.

Stockholm, April 11, O. S. Yesterday in the Senate the King of Sweden made Choice of M. Reintwyck and Baron Flemming, to go as his Ministers to Vienna and Paris, where they were formerly Secretaries to Ambassadors.

Copenhagen, April 26, N. S. His Danish Majesty reviewed the Regiment of Horse-Guards on the 22d Instant, but the Infantry

belonging to the Garrison of this City probably will not be review'd this Year, a great Number of the Soldiers being daily employed in carrying on the new Buildings. The Secretary at War set out the Beginning of the Week for Fuhnen and Jutland, to review the Troops in those Quarters; which is a pretty sure Sign that the Court has now laid aside all Thoughts of travelling this Summer. A Frigate of about 30 Guns is fitted out for Petersbourg, in order to exercise the Cadets in the Sea Service.

Dresden, April 27. The King has made Count Rutowski General of Horse, and given him at the same time the Command of the 1200 Saxons that are in Poland. As the Prince Royal is perfectly recovered, it is resolved that he shall marry the Princess by Procuration for Don Carlos. M. Donski, Commissioner on the Part of King Stanislaus for selling the Estates in Poland belonging to that Prince, having been charged, in his last Return from Luneville, with the reciprocal Recognition between King Stanislaus and King Augustus, and the Exchange of their two Letters on that Subject having been made, the King of Poland has notified the Marriage of the Princess Royal by a Letter to King Stanislaus.

Whereas it has been represented to His Majesty, That on the Fourteenth Day of this Instant April, in the Evening, a great Number of People assembled themselves in the City of Bristol, in a riotous and tumultuous Manner; that the Magistrates of the said City having caused the Proclamation for preventing Tumults to be read, they dispersed at that Time, but assembled again the next Morning in the same riotous Manner: And whereas an anonymous Letter was, on the 18th Instant, taken up in the Court of the Dwelling-House of Nathaniel Day, Esq; Mayor of that City, threatening him with Mischief, in case he should molest any Person on Account of the said Riots: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the several Crimes above-mentioned, or either of them, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any of the said Offenders that shall discover his or their Accomplice or Accomplices in the said Riots, or in writing, sending, or dropping the Threatning Letter aforesaid, so that they or any of them be apprehended and convicted thereof.

"And, I pray, accuse none wrongfully; if you doth, it shall be — Fire to you."

The Postmaster General thinks proper to make it publicly known, that whoever shall apprehend the

And whereas a Practice hath of late prevailed for Persons in Holy Orders residing within the Liberties of the King's Bench and Fleet Prisons, and elsewhere, to marry Persons without either the Publication of Banns, or any Licences obtained, and to give Certificates of such Marriages without the said Duty thereon, to the Diminution of that Part of his Majesty's Revenue, as well as the Ruin of many Families: And the Commissioners for managing his Majesty's Stamp Duties being determined, as far as in them lies, to suppress the said Practice, have commenced several Prosecutions against Persons residing within the Liberties of the King's Bench and Fleet Prisons, for the said Offence: And that no one may pretend Ignorance herein, the Commissioners have thought fit to give this Notice, that they will for the future prosecute with the utmost Severity, all such as they shall receive Information of, to have married without such Banns or Licence, and to have granted such Certificate without the said Duty, contrary to the Directions of the said several Acts.
