The humble Address of the Mayor, Burgesses and Commonalty of the City of Bristol.

May it please your Majesty.

YOUR Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects the Mayor, Burgesses, and Commonalty of the City of Bristol, with all Humility beg Leave to congratulate your Majesty on the Birth of a Prince born to his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales.

It is a Circumstance of National Felicity peculiar to your Majesty's Government, that every Incident, which in any Measure gives your Majesty Satisfaction, contributes in the same Proportion to the common Joy of your Subjects. The Stability of your Majesty's Throne is the Foundation of their present Security; and they rejoice in the Increase of your Royal House, as an Earnest of Future Blessings to them.

We should be unworthy of the Happiness we enjoy under your Majesty's auspicious Government, did we not entertain the most grateful Sense of it.

We therefore beg Leave with the utmost Duty and Gratitude to acknowledge the Wisdom, Equity and Paternal Goodness of your Majesty's Administration; and to assure your Majesty, that we shall be always ambitious of recommending ourselves to your Royal Approbation, by a due Regard to the Laws of our Country, and a most dutiful and affectionate Attachment to your Majesty's Person and Government.

Petersbourg, May 27. Count Werthern, one of the King of Poland's Chamberlains, arrived here from Dresden two Days ago, and Yesterday had an Audience of the Czarina; in which he notified in Form the Mar-

riage of the Prince's Royal to the King of Naples and Sicily. By the last Advices from Felt Marshal Munich this Court is informed, that he began his March the 13th Instant with the two last Divisions of the Army.

Copenhagen, June 21, N. S. On the 17th Instant two Ships arrived here, one from Tranquebar, and the other from China, on Account of the Danish East India Company.

This Evening, the Ceremony of publishing the Baptism of the young Prince, Son of their Royal Highnesses, the Prince and Princess of Wales, was performed, and the Office completed, by the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of Oxford, Rector of St. James's Westminster, in his Royal Highness's Apartment in Norfolk House in St. James's Square. The Godfathers were the King of Sweden represented by the Lord Baltimore, and the Duke of Saxe-Gotha represented by the Marquis of Caernarvon; the Godmother was the Queen of Prussia represented by the Lady Charlotte Edwin. The Name of the young Prince pronounced on this Occasion by the Lord Baltimore, was George William Frederick. His Royal Highness the Prince was present, as was her Royal Highness sitting on a Bed of State, the Lords and Ladies of their Bed-chambers attending.

Excise Office, London, June 23, 1738.

Whereas Thomas Bingham, of Rolvenden near Cranbrook in Kent, did, on the 12th of April last, receive a Threatning Letter, requiring him to send Fifty Pounds to a Place therein appointed: And whereas on the 27th of the same Month, two Men armed with Cutlasses and Pistols came to the said Bingham's Lodgings, and demanded the said Fifty Pounds, threatening Vengeance in Case of Refusal; The Commissioners of Excise do hereby give Notice, that if any Person will make Discovery of the two Persons aforesaid, or any of their Accomplices, so as they may be brought to Justice, they shall receive the Reward of Forty Pounds, to be paid at their Office in the Old Jewry, upon the Conviction of each Offender: One of the said Persons was a well grown Man, about six Feet high, of a ruddy Complexion, and a round Visage, about 30 Years of Age, and wore a light coloured Bob Wig; the other a slender Man of low Stature, about five Feet two or three Inches, of a fallow Complexion, wore a Velvet Cap, the Cape of the same button'd over his Chin, appeared to be upwards of 30 Years of Age.
