Whereas a great Number of disorderly Persons assembled in a riotous and tumultuous Manner in the Month of October last, and committed several notorious Outrages in the City of Bristol, and the Neighbourhood thereof: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned therein, is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to such of the said Offenders as shall discover any Two or more of their Accomplices, before the End of this present Month of December, so as they may be apprehended and convicted of the said Crime.
