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Petersbourg, January 6.

WE hear that Baron Keyserling, her Czarish Majesty's Minister at the Court of Dresden, who arrived here the 2d Instant from Warsaw, is endeavouring to dissuade this Ministry from sending Troops to Hungary by the Way of Poland, lest it should occasion new Troubles in that Country.

Warsaw, Jan. 29, N. S. We hear from Officers who have lately left the Russian Service, that the Tatars had begun their Incurfions, but as yet had had little Success. The Marquis Malaspin, Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of Naples, is arrived at this Court, and has had his Audiences of all the Royal Family; at which he was received with great Marks of Distinction and Esteem.

Copenhagen, Jan. 16, N. S. Two new built Ships, called the Jutland and the Danbrog, of 70 Guns each, were launched here the 27th, in Presence of the Court.
