To the King's most Excellent Majesty.

The humble Address of the Mayor, Burgesses, and Commonalty of the City of Bristol.

*May it please your Majesty,*

**T**O permit your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, the Mayor, Burgesses, and Commonalty of the City of Bristol, humbly to congratulate the Increase of your Royal Family on the Birth of another Prince, Son of his Royal Highness the Prince of Wales.

This happy Event, as it naturally contributes to soften the Cares of Empire, which so visibly affect your Majesty for the common Good of your People; so does it at the same Time open to them the most agreeable Prospect, in that the Felicity of your Majesty's Reign may (by the Permission of divine Providence) be continued down to succeeding Ages, by a Line of Princes who will one Day do Honour even to that illustrious Stock from which they spring.

This, Sir, is the unanimous Wish of us your faithful Subjects the Citizens of Bristol, who entertain a just Sense of the various Blessings we enjoy by your Majesty's Protection and Government, under the Influence whereof we rest assured that our excellent Constitution will remain entire, that its Benefits already reaped, may continue to us and our Posterity.

*Petersbourg, Feb. 24.* The 20th Instant Felt Marshal Munich's only Son was married in the Great Hall of the Palace, in the Czarina's Presence, to Madamoiselle Mengden, one of her Majesty's Maids of Honour.

That Night and the next there was a Ball at Court, to which all the foreign Ministers were invited. The 21st Felt Marshal Lacy set out for Livonia to see his Lady and Family; from whence, after a short Stay, he will go and join his Army which is quarter'd along the Rivers Don and Donetz. As yet no Plan of Operations for the next Campaign is actually formed; some are of Opinion that Felt Marshal Lacy will be sent again towards the Crimea to make a Diversion.

*Petersbourg, March 3.* The 28th past a Courier arrived here from the Army in the Ukraine, with Advice, that on the 16th of February, a Party of about 5000 Budziack and Nogay Tartars came to the Banks of the River Nieper, a little above Perevolotzna, 3000 of which passed the same; but Major General Bachmetoff with a Body of regular Troops and some Cossacks, having cut off their Retreat, entirely defeated those Tartars; and 'tis thought many of the rest, and a great Number of Horses, will be lost, by the Cold, in their Return home. Last Thursday Night died Baron Schastroff, after a long Illness. The same Day the Prince of Hesse, with his Princess and Daughter, set out from hence in order to go to Hombourg to see his Father.

*Berlin, March 27, N. S.* On Wednesday last, the 18th Instant, between Three and Four in the Morning, died here of a lingering Illness, in the 62d Year of his Age, M. Gromkow, Felt Marshal of his Prussian Majesty's Armies, Colonel of a Regiment of Foot, Knight of the Muscovite Order of St. Andrew, and of the Polish Order of the White Eagle, Minister of State and of War, Vice-President of the College called *Grand Directoire*, and Provost of the Cathedral of Brandenburg: He had been taken with a sudden Suffocation last Monday, but seem'd pretty well recovered; and the Evening before his Death, he supped, and went to Bed without any ill Symptom; but in the Night he was taken with such another Suffocation, which carried him off.
