Stockholm, May 15.

Yesterday the College of War issued out an Order pursuant to one from the King of Sweden and Senate, that all the Officers should repair to their respective Posts. Those which the two Regiments, have received, are drawn in general Terms, viz. that they should rendezvous at Carlscrona by the latter End of next Month, to be ready to embark there towards the 7th or 10th of July, without specifying the Port they are to land at; they are to find their Tents at Carlscrona, which are actually making there. The French Squadron, as it is said, is expected at Carlsham, six Swedish Miles from Carlscrona, before the Term fix'd for those Regiments to embark.

Berlin, May 30. His Prussian Majesty was pleased on Monday last to promote Lieutenant General Schwerin to the Rank of General of the Foot. That General proposes, with the King his Master's Leave, to set out next Week for Carlsbadt, in order to use the Baths there for the Recovery of his Health, which for sometime past has been in a very indifferent State. This Court had two Posts ago an Account from Wesel, that in Consequence of a Resolution taken by the States of the Province of Guelderland, two of his Prussian Majesty's Engineers, who have Rank as Captains, had been taken up at Nimeguen, by way of Ranzel, for a Burgher of that Town, who about two Years ago was forcibly carried away by two Prussian Officers. One Day last Week the King of Prussia sent to the French Minister's House here, a Set of fine Prussian Horses; which Horses are said to be designed for a Present to the Marquess de la Chetardie, who is recalled from hence, and appointed his most Christian Majesty's Ambassadour at the Court of Petersbourg.
