**T**HE Accounts we have from Italy and other Parts, of the Progress of the Great Duke and Dutchess of Tuscany and Prince Charles of Lorraine, in their Return from Florence hither, import in Substance; That the Grand Duke designed to have gone by Sea from Leghorn to Genoa, and the Republick of Genoa made great Preparations to receive him: But the Wind not being favourable at the Time his Royal Highness proposed to embark, he resolved to save Time by making the Journey by Land, leaving the Grand Dutchess at Florence, and appointing her to go to Milan, where he would meet her in his Return from Turin. His Royal Highness and Prince Charles of Lorraine his Brother, passing thro' Piacenza, Tortona, and Alessandria, arrived at Turin the 3d Instant, where they were received with all Marks of Affection and Esteem by the King of Sardinia and the Queen their Sister, and were entertained with all Magnificence. On the 6th his Royal Highness and the Prince his Brother went to Milan, where they found the Grand Dutchess, who had arrived there the 3d, and been received as Archdutchess of Austria with the greatest Splendor and publick Demonstrations of Joy; so were his Royal Highness and Prince Charles; and on the 8th they all left Milan, took their Way by Lodi, Cremona, and Mantua, to the Tirolese, and arrived at Inspruck on the 13th. The Dutchess Dowager of Lorraine had been appointed to meet her two Sons the Grand Duke and Prince Charles at Stokach, and her Royal Highness, with the Princess her Daughter, took her Journey thither from Commerci; but at Schaffhuyzen, a Courier met her, with Letters from the Grand Duke, desiring her to proceed to Inspruck, which she did accordingly, and arrived there on the 19th; and after four Days Stay there, her Royal Highness set out the 25th on her Return to Commerci by the Way she came:

The Grand Duke and Dutchess, with Prince Charles, set out at the same time for this Place, and arriving here this Morning, proceeded immediately for Laxemburg, where the Emperour now is.

*Vienna, June 3, N. S.* There is as yet no News of the Motions of the Turks; as to the Imperialists, there are about 25000 Men drawn together already at Peterwaradin, towards forming the grand Army; amongst them are several sick, but not one with the least Indication of the Plague. Part of the Garrison of Belgrade, is said to have been drawn out towards forming this Body at Peterwaradin, which gives Ground to conjecture that the Imperialists have a Design upon Zwornick.
