*Petersbourg, May 19.*

**A** Report we had that a Party of Calmucks had gained a great Victory over the Cuban Tartars, was confirmed three Days ago by a Courier this Court received from Don Duc-Ombo their Chief, with the following Particulars, viz. 7000 Calmucks passed the River Cuban and entred the Mountains, where they attacked and defeated a great Body of those Tartars; 3000 were killed on the Spot, 1000 drowned in endeavouring to make their Escape over a River, and 3000 taken Prisoners. Above 100000 Sheep, and a great Number of Horses and other Cattle, were taken and brought away by the Calmucks.

*Stockholm, May 25.* The College of the Chamber have sent for all the Governours of Provinces which are in Town, to declare to them in the King of Sweden's Name, that as in the present Juncture of Affairs their Presence might be necessary in their respective Provinces, it was his Swedish Majesty's Pleasure, that they should without Loss of Time repair to their Posts.

*Vienna, June 3, N. S.* The Grand Duke and Dutchess of Tuscany arriving here by Water on the 27th past, found six of the Emperour's Coaches waiting for them, in which their Royal Highnesses and their Attendants proceeded to Laxemburg. On the 28th the Grand Duke, accompanied by his Brother Prince Charles, returned hither, and took a View of the six Ships of War newly built here to serve this Campaign on the Danube. His Royal Highness was received on board by General Count Pallavicini, under whose Direction those Ships were built, and by several other Officers, and at his going off was saluted by a Discharge of 43 Pieces of Cannon. On the 29th those Ships fell down the Danube, attended by a great Number of Barks and other Vessels laden with Stores: They are named the Eagle, the Neptune, the Centaur, the Siren, the Tyger, the Cerberus. When they come to Belgrade, they will form a little Fleet of 13 Ships of War, by the Addition of four of 50 Guns each which were built here in 1737, called the Imperial Eagle, the Lyon, the Sea-Horse, and the Triton, and three others built at Belgrade. They are all well mann'd with Voluntier-Seamen from several Parts, and Officers chosen for their Expe-

rience in Naval Service, and have on board a considerable Number of Imperial Marines; as also of Gunners and Mariners furnished by the Order of Malta, which Order has also furnished a Body of Horse to serve in Hungary this Campaign. The said Fleet carries 512 Pieces of Cannon and 24 Mortars, and a strong Detachment of Soldiers, among them one Battallion of the Regiment of Pallavicini. The Tyger and the Cerberus, being the least of the Fleet, have a double Range of a kind of Bayonets lying flat all along the upper Part of the Sides of each Ship, which in Case of Action can be instantly raised and pointed in a due Position to keep off the Enemy from Boarding.

*Vienna, June 6, N. S.* The Grand Vizier is said to be arrived at Sophia with an Army of 80,000 Men, and a Body of some thousand Turks has appeared near Orfova.

*Berlin, June, 9 N. S.* All the single Reviews being now over, except that of the Regiment of Gens d'Armes, which is fixed for next Thursday, the King of Prussia has declared his Intentions of removing again to Potsdam on Friday next. His Prussian Majesty's Journey to Prussia, which has been talked of for some Time, is also fixed for the 7th or 8th of next Month. M. Rodenschild, the Swedish Minister, arrived here this Afternoon.

*Berlin, June 13, N. S.* On Wednesday last the Prince Royal marched out of this Town with his Regiment, and returned to his Quarters at Rupin; where his Royal Highness will continue till his Prussian Majesty goes to Prussia, and then he will join the King his Father either here or somewhere on the Road, in order to accompany him in that Journey. On Thursday last M. Rodenschild, the new Swedish Minister, had his first Audience of the King of Prussia, and the next Day he had the Honour to dine with his Prussian Majesty. This Morning early his Majesty removed from hence to Potsdam.

*Kensington June 12.*

Yesterday being the Anniversary of His Majesty's Succession to the Crown, there was a very numerous and splendid Appearance at Court of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment His Majesty on that happy Occasion. The Guns in St. James's Park and at the Tower were fired, and all publick Demonstrations of Joy were made.
