*Toplitz, July 11, N. S.*

**T**HE King and Queen of Poland having fixed the 7th Instant for their Departure from Dresden for this Place, the foreign Ministers went to Court the 6th to wish their Majesties a good Journey and Benefit by using the Waters here: On which Occasion Mr. Villers, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Great Britain, having received Permission from his Court to make a Tour to England, for settling his private Affairs, took Leave of their Majesties. The 7th in the Morning the King and Queen set out from Dresden, and arrived here that Evening. They were received at the Frontier of Bohemia, on the Part of the Emperour, by the Count de Clari, grand Huntsman of the Kingdom of Bohemia, and Lord of Toplitz. The King was attended by the Count de Bruhl his chief Minister, and the Queen by the Steward of her Household Count Wratisslaw, who is also the Emperour's Ambassador. On the 8th the Count de Clari was brought to Court by the Chamberlain Count Fleming, in one of the King's Coaches, and had Audiences of their Majesties, by whom he was graciously received: and was reconducted to his House with the same Ceremony. He return'd afterwards to Court, and had the Honour to dine at the King's Table with other Persons of Distinction. On the 9th the Marquess Malaspina, Minister Plenipotentiary from the King of the two Sicilies, came hither from Dresden. And that Day a great Number of Persons of Quality of both Sexes had the Honour to dine at their Majesties Table; and at the drinking of every Health, Drums were beat, Trumpets sounded, and Cannon fired.

*Vienna, July 11.* Our latest Advices from the Imperial Army commanded by Felt-Marshal Count Wallis, give the following Particulars by way of Journal. On the 18th of last Month Count Neiperger General of the Artillery, who commands in the Banat of Temeswaer, arrived in the Camp which was then at Semlin; the next Day a great Council of War was held for settling the Operations in this Campaign; and Count Neiperger set out on his Return to Arrath, where his Body of Forces have their Rendezvous. The 20th, at giving out the Word, it was order'd that we should hold ourselves in Readiness to march. The 21st a Battallion of the Regiment of Marulli arrived in the Camp. General Palavicini arrived at Belgrade from Vienna, with the six new Ships of War, which make the Number of the Flotilla 14 Ships. The 22d a Battallion of Seckendorf came to the Camp from Segedin; arrived there also the Lieutenant Felt-Marshal Baron Wittorff, with the Regiment of Cuirassiers of Charles Palfi, and that of Dragoons of Preissing. The 25th we were joynd in the Camp by a Battallion of the Bavarian Regiment of Preissing, which had been garrison'd at Segedin. The

26th the Prince of Saxe-Hildsbourghausen came to the Camp, and at giving out the Word, it was order'd that the whole Army should make ready to march and enter a new Camp mark'd out above Merova; whereupon the Reveille was beat at Midnight, and the 27th at Break of Day we march'd through Belgrade, and into the Camp at Merova; where the Army form'd two Lines, one without the great Line of Belgrade, and the other within it; the Right Wing to the Save, the Left to the Danube. The 28th arrived Baron Sehr General of the Horse. On the 29th arrived Prince Charles of Lorraine, and Felt-Marshal Count Styrum; came into the Camp also the two Regiments of Dragoons of Savoy and d'Ollone, and a Battallion of Bavarian Auxiliaries. The 30th a strong Party was sent out to get Intelligence of the Enemy, who are said to draw their chief Strength together at Jagodina. The two Lines of the Army being divided by the great Line of Belgrade, a proper Number of Men were set to work to open a Communication, and at each Brigade one or two Apertures were made, in order that on Occasion of an Attack, the two Lines may succour each other as the Case may require. On the 2d Instant arrived some Auxiliary Troops of Bavarians, and the Regiment of Munster was hourly expected. The 3d, some Horse and Foot were sent out to Forage, which were surprized by a Party of the Enemy, who took some of their Carts and Horses.

Baron Sehr, who commands the Horse, is promoted to the Rank of Felt-Marshal. Count Wallis continues still with the main Army in the Lines at Merova; where there were no Advices of the Motions of the Turkish Army. Count Neiperger continues at Arrath with a Body of 20000 Men; and the Prince of Lobkowitz, who commands in Transylvania, has posted great Part of his Forces at the Porta Ferrea.

On the 4th Instant the Emperor and Empress went to take the Diversion of Hunting in the Neighbourhood of Burgerstorf, where they were met by the Elector and Electress of Bavaria, with the Electoral Prince their Son: And after about two Hours Conversation they parted, their Imperial Majesties returning to the Palace Favorita, and the Elector and Electress with the Prince their Son to Melck; in order to their Return to Munich.
