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Copenhagen, September 1.

THE Marquess d'Antin goes this Day to dine with the King of Denmark, but probably will not then take his Leave; since he intends, it is said, to make a Journey to Hirschholm, in order to pay his Respects to the young Princess Louisa, who did not come to Town with the rest of the Royal Family. Their Danish Majesties return to Morrow or next Day into the Country; and the French Squadron, it is thought, will weigh Anchor before the End of the Week.

Vienna, Aug. 29, N. S. The ordinary Journal from the Imperial Army at Surtock, has the following Particulars. On the 19th in the Evening Orders were issued to the Left Wing, to get ready to march, and to advance towards Semlin under the Command of the Prince of Hildsburghaufen, leaving behind them all their Tents and Baggage. Colonel Cobon who commanded in the Redoubt at Czentos with the Battallion of Julay, had Orders sent him at the same Time to abandon that Redoubt without ruining it, and to retire with his Battallion; and then the Bridge over the Danube was taken away, and most of the Boats sent to Peterwaradin under a Guard of 600 Men. On the 21st Prince Charles of Lorrain returned from Futtack to the Army, having recovered his Health. Our General Marshal Wallis grows better daily. On the 22d the Regiment of Dragoons of Young Wirtemberg marched towards the Save.

Vienna, Aug. 29, N. S. The Court received last Night an Estafetta with Letters from the Army of the 24th which say, that on the 19th Instant in the Evening it was reported to Marshal Wallis at Sortock, that the Turks had laid a Bridge over the Save; whereupon Prince Hildsburghaufen got in readiness by Eleven a-Clock that Night 23 Battallions and eight Regiments of Horse, with which

he arrived at Ten a-Clock the next Morning at a Place called Beschani, within half an Hour's march of Semlin. Instead of a Bridge, he found, upon examining the Banks of the Save, that the Turks had only raised a Battery at the Place where they might have proposed to lay a Bridge; whereupon he made the proper Dispositions for preventing such a Design, by placing Bodies of Rascians at several Distances from Semlin along the Save quite to Ratscha; and in a certain thick Wood, near which the Turks would be the likelier to send over their Men in Boats, in order to facilitate their Bridge, he hid 600 Grenadiers supported by 600 Horse; and having made these Preparations, was expecting the Event: After which, he passed over into Belgrade, and staid there some Hours. These Letters add, that there was no Breach on the 22d. The Day before, and the preceding Night, the Turks had made a continual Fire, but it diminished considerably in the Afternoon of the 22d. Letters from the Russian Army of the 10th Instant say, that their Left Wing was still at the Place where they pass'd the River Dniester, and that their Right Wing was extended towards Choczin. That the Seraskier of Bender was arrived at Choczin with a Guard of 500 Horse, and was followed by a Body of 4000 Men.

Paris, Sept. 5, N. S. Madame Louise Elizabeth of France, their Majesties eldest Daughter, having entred on the 14th of last Month into the 13th Year of her Age, the King fixed the 26th for the Ceremony of celebrating the Marriage of that Princess with Don Philip Infante of Spain, who is in his 20th Year; which Marriage had been agreed upon in the Month of February last between his Majesty and the King of Spain. On the 23d the Marquess de Lamina having received full Powers as Ambassadour extraordinary from the King of Spain, was conducted with great Splendor to an Audience of the King, and in the Name of his Catholick Majesty, demanded



manded Madame in Marriage for Don Philip, which with great Solemnity was granted by the King. The Marquess having delivered to the Duke of Orleans the Procuration from Don Philip, confirmed by the King and Queen of Spain, appointing his Highness to represent him in the Celebration of the Marriage, was conducted on the 25th with the like Magnificence to Versailles, where in the Presence of the King and Queen, the Dauphin, and the Princesses of the Royal Family, the Princes and Princesses of the Blood, the Ceremony of the Elpoufals of Madame with the Duke of Orleans as Don Philip's Proxy, was performed in the King's Apartment by the Cardinal de Rohan. On the 26th the Marriage Ceremony was performed by that Cardinal in the Chapel of the Palace of Versailles, in the Presence of their Majesties with the Royal Family, the Princes and Princesses of the Blood, the chief Nobility of both Sexes, the foreign Ministers and the Officers of the Household, making a very numerous Court. That Evening their Majesties gave a great Entertainment, and a Firework was plaid off. On the 27th Madame received at Versailles the Compliments of the City of Paris, the chief Magistrates attending in a Body, and the Prevost des Marchands making a Speech. They paid the like Compliments on the 28th to the Marquess de Lamina at Paris, on the Marriage of Madame with the Infante Don Philip. On the 29th a fine Firework prepared at the Charge of the City of Paris was plaid off; and at Night there was a grand Entertainment in the Town House, and also a Ball. On the 31st Madame began her Journey towards the Frontiers of Spain, attended by the Dutcheſs de Tallard and other Persons chosen by His Majesty, with a Detachment of his Life Guards. The King conducted Madame from Versailles two Leagues on her Way.
