they could not pass the Moralles that are on the Side of the Danube facing that Ifland. The Safety of our Navigation on the Danube diminishes daily, for the Turks put out with their finall Vellels from the Borza, and flipping by our large Ships and Veffels, take all the little ones they meet. The Breach which the Enemy are making in the Baftion of St. Elizabeth, begins to be confiderable, fo that it cofts a great deal of Labour and Trouble to repair it tolerably from Time to Time. The Enemy have made another Breach in the Baftion of St. Francisco, and though they make no great Progress in it, they are continually firing upon it. We have Intelligence that the Turks are making all neceffary Difpo-fitions for passing the Save at Dragoloffski, having got together a good Number of Boats there; and 'tis the more fulpected they defign to attempt that Paffage, because they have cut the Banks of the River on their Side to draw off Part of the Water.
