A PROCLAMATION,

GEORGE, R.

W Hereas our Parliament stands prorogued to Thursday the Eighteenth Day of October next; we, with the Advice of our Privy Council, do hereby publish and declare, that the said Parliament shall be further prorogued on the said Eighteenth Day of October, to Thursday the 15th Day of November next ensuing; and we have given Order to our Chancellor of Great Britain to prepare a Commission for proroguing the same accordingly. And we do hereby further declare our Royal Will and Pleasure, that the said Parliament shall, on the said Fifteenth Day of November next, be held and sit for the Dispatch of divers weighty and important Affairs: And the Lords Spiritual and Temporal, and the Knights, Citizens, and Burghesses, and the Commissioners for Shires and Burghs of the House of Commons, are hereby required to give their Attendance accordingly at Westminster on the said 15th Day of November next.

Given at Our Court at Kensington the Twentieth Day of September, 1739, in the Thirteenth Year of our Reign.

GOD save the KING.

Belgrade, Sept. 5. On the 3d Instant, pursuant to the Articles of Peace, the Demolition of our Fortifications was begun, in which Work 2000 Men are daily employed. The Place is to remain garrisoned by the Imperialists, till the said Fortifications are levelled. In the mean time the Gate of Wirtemberg and the adjoining Casernes, are in the Possession of the Turks, and there they are to keep, without entering the Town, till the Demolition be perfected within the three Months limited; and their Quarters are fenced about with Palisades. Some Imperial Battallions

are already marched from hence to the Camp at Semlin. All the Artillery and Stores of Ammunition and Provisions, are to be carried up the Danube in our Vessels.

Belgrade, Sept. 10. On the 7th Instant six or seven Thousand Janissaries would have entered the Town by Force, and the Bashaw to whom the Grand Vizier had given the Command of those Janissaries who had taken Possession of the Gate of Wirtemberg and the adjoining Casernes, was obliged to order his Men with their Sabres to drive them away and to draw up the Bridges. The next Day the Janissaries who are at the said Gate, attempted to enter the Citadel; but the Imperial Officer who commands in it, having caused the Cannon to be pointed against them, they were obliged to retire. The Grand Vizier has offer'd several Millions provided the Fortifications be let stand in the Condition they are in; but his Offer was rejected.

Stockholm, Aug. 31. The Preparations for Transporting 6000 Men to Finland still go on, the Draughts out of the Regiments of Helsingland and Westerbothnie are to be embarked at a Place called Uma, which lies between their two Quarters; in the mean Time Field Pieces, Ammunition Waggons, &c. are continually shipping for that Country, and Contracts have been entred into for Cannon of 24 and 16 Pounders, Bullets and Bombshells to a considerable Quantity. The Queen of Sweden returned last Wednesday Night from Carlsberg to this City, but his Swedish Majesty having found himself perfectly well by the Air and the Exercise of Shooting, has deferred his Return till the Beginning of next Week.

Berlin, Sept. 15, N. S. By the last Letters from Potzdam, we hear, that his Prussian Majesty was, as this Day, to go and dine at Machenau, a little Hunting Seat not far from the abovementioned Place, and that in the Evening, or to Morrow, he proposed to be at Wusterhausen.
