A P R O C L A M A T I O N,

For encouraging Seamen to enter themselves on board His Majesty's Ships of War.

W Hereas it is our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all such Seamen, who shall voluntarily enter themselves in our Service; We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of our Privy Council, to publish this our Royal Proclamation: and we do hereby promise and declare, That all such able Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty two, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for our Service, who shall on or before the Thirty first Day of October next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of our Ships, or the chief Officers on board such Tenders, as shall be employed for raising Men for the Service of our Navy, shall receive, as our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Two Guineas each Man; and all such ordinary Seamen, fit for our Service, who shall so enter themselves, as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as our Royal Bounty; such respective Sums to be paid them by the respective Clerks of the Check, residing at the Ports or Places where the Ships into which they shall be entered shall be, immediately after the second Muster of such Seamen: And we do hereby further promise and declare, That all such Seamen, who shall so voluntarily enter themselves, as aforesaid, shall be assured of receiving six Months Pay, although there should happen to be no Occasion for their Service so long: And we do declare, That the Qualifications of the Seamen so entering themselves, as aforesaid, shall be certified by the Captain or chief Officer and Boatswain of the Ship or Vessel where they shall enter. And for Prevention of any Abuses by any Persons leaving the Vessels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on board any other our Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty-Money; we do hereby declare and command, That such Seamen belonging to any of our Ships or Vessels, as shall

absent themselves from any of the said Ships or Vessels to which they shall belong, and shall enter themselves on board any other of our said Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the said Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be severely punished according to their Demerits.

Vienna, Sept. 30. Letters which the Imperial Court received from Belgrade the 24th Instant brought an Account, that on the 18th a definitive Treaty of Peace between the Emperour and the Ottoman Porte, was signed by Count Neiperg on the Part of his Imperial Majesty, and by the Grand Vizier on the Part of the Sultan, and by the French Ambassadour on the Part of the most Christian King, as Mediator and Guarantee. The Articles of it are not yet divulged; but it is said, that a Prolongation of nine Months for the Demolition of Belgrade is therein agreed. On the 19th the Grand Vizier (accompanied by the French Ambassadour) marched with the main Body of his Army, on his Return to Constantinople, taking with him the Imperial Hostages, a Colonel, a Major and four Captains, who are supposed to have been given for the Security of the 500 Turks that are to remain in Belgrade till it be entirely demolished. A Treaty of Peace between the Ottoman Porte and the Empress of Russia, was signed the same Day as was the other Treaty, viz. on the 18th, between her Minister in the Turkish Camp, and the Grand Vizier, under the Guaranty of France. The Articles are not yet made publick, but it is rumoured that Asof is to be demolished, and then yielded to the Turks; and that the Russians shall be at Liberty to build Forts in proper Places, to hinder the Junction of the Inhabitants of the two Tartaries, and thereby prevent their making Inroads as formerly into the Russian Dominions. On the 24th and 26th Instant, Orders from the Emperour were dispatched to Field-Mar-
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shal Count Wallis, and to the General of the Artillery Count Neiperg, by which the first was charged forthwith to give up the Command of the Army to Field-Marshal General Baron Seher, and to repair to Ziget, there to remain under Arrest till his Imperial Majesty's further Pleasure should be known; and the other was bid to repair immediately to Orsch near Raab, there to be confined till further Orders. The Emperor has caused a circular Letter to be sent to all his Ministers at Foreign Courts, setting forth at large the bad Conduct and Management of the said Counts Wallis and Neiperg. The Imperial Army is by this Time upon their March into Quarters, except 5000 Men, who are to remain in Belgrade to demolish it.

Berlin, Oct. 3, N. S. Letters which are just come in from Vienna, have brought us the News, that a definitive Treaty of Peace between the Czarina and the Turks, as well as that of the Emperor, had been signed in the Ottoman Camp before Belgrade on the 18th of last Month. The King of Prussia being come to Town on Tuesday Evening last, the next Morning between Eight and Nine M. Pudeweltz came to the Marquess de la Chetardie's Lodgings, and having taken him in his Coach, conducted his Excellency to his Audience. The Marquess de Vallory arrived here the same Evening as his Prussian Majesty, but he declined taking his Audience the next Day on Account of his being a little indisposed; his Prussian Majesty has therefore invited both him and the Marquess de la Chetardie to come to Wusterhausen on Sunday next.
