A PROCLAMATION,

For encouraging Seamen to enter themfelves on board His Majefty's Ships of War.

GEORGE R.

T Hereas it is our Royal Intention to give all due Encouragement to all fuch Seamen, who shall voluntarily enter themselves in our Service; We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of our Privy Council, to publish this our Royal Proclamation : and we do hereby promife and declare, That all fuch able Seamen, not above the Age of Fifty two, nor under the Age of Twenty Years, fit for our Service, who shall on or before the Thirty first Day of October next, voluntarily enter themselves to ferve in our Royal Navy, either with the Cap-tains or Lieutenants of our Ships, or the chief Officers on board fuch Tenders, as shall be employed for raifing Men for the Service of our Navy, shall receive, as our Royal Bounty, the Sum of Two Guineas each Man; and all fuch ordinary Seamen, fit for our Service, who shall so enter themselves, as aforesaid, shall receive the Sum of Thirty Shillings each Man, as our Royal Bounty; fuch respective Sums to be paid them by the respective Clerks of the Check, refiding at the Ports or Places where the Ships into which they shall be entered fhall be, immediately after the fecond Mufter of fuch Seamen : And we do hereby further promife and declare, That all fuch Seamen, who fhall fo voluntarily enter themfelves, as aforefaid, shall be affured of receiving fix Months Pay, although there fhould happen to be no Occasion for their Service fo long : And we do declare, That the Qua-lifications of the Seamen fo entering them-felves, as aforefaid, shall be certified by the Captain or chief Officer and Boats ain of the Ship or Veffel where they shall enter. And for Prevention of any Abules by any Perlons leaving the Veflels to which they shall belong, and entering themselves on board any other our Ships or Veffels, in order to ob-tain the faid Bounty-Money ; we do hereby declare and command, That fuch Seamen belonging to any of our Ships or Vellels, as shall

ablent themselves from any of the faid Ships or Veffels to which they shall belong, and shall enter themselves on board any other of our said Ships or Vessels, in order to obtain the faid Bounty, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships or Vessels they shall leave, but also be severely punished according to their Demerits.

Given at our Court at Kenfington the . Twenty feventh Day of September, 1739, and in the Thirteenth Year of our Reign.

Letters which the Vienna, Sept. 30. Imperial Court received from Belgrade the 24th Instant brought an Account, that on the 18th a definitive Treaty of Peace between the Emperour and the Ottoman Porte, was figned by Count Neiperg on the Part of his Imperial Majefty, and by the Grand Vizier on the Part of the Sultan, and by the French Ambaffadour on the Part of the most Christian King, as Mediator and Guarantee. The Articles of it are not yet divulged; but it is faid, that a Prolongation of nine Months for the Demolition of Belgrade is therein agreed. On the 19th the Grand Vizier (accompanied by the French Ambafladour) marched with the main Body of his Army, on his Return to Conftantinople, taking with him the Imperial Hoftages, a Colonel, a Major and four Captains, who are fuppoled to have been given for the Security of the 500 Turks that are to remain in Belgrade till it be entirely demolifhed. A Treaty of Peace between the Ottoman Porte and the Empress of Russia, was figned the fame Day as was the other Treaty, viz. on the 18th, between her Minister in the Turkish Camp, and the Grand Vizier, under the Guaranty of France. The Articles are not yet made publick, but it is rumou ed that Aloph is to be demolifhed, and then yielded to the Turks ; and that the Ruffians shall be at Liberty to build Forts in proper Places, to hinder the Junction of the Inhabitants of the two Tartaries, and thereby prevent their making Inroads as for-merly into the Ruffian Dominions. On the 24th and 26th Inftant, Orders from the Emperour were dispatched to Field-Marfhal

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
