Vienna, Oct. 31, N. S.

Hambourg, Nov. 6. N. S. General Schullenburg, who has been for several Years his Danish Majesty's Envoy Extraordinary at the Court of France, arrived here Yesterday from Paris, and intends to set out in a few Days for Copenhagen.

Dublin, October 31.

Yesterday being the Anniversary of his Majesty's Birth-day, the Great Guns were fired at the Barracks, and answered by Volleys from the Regiments in Garrison, which were drawn out upon Oxmantown Green. At Noon there was a vast Concourse of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction of both Sexes, who appeared in great Splendor to compliment his Grace the Lord Lieutenant, before whom an Ode set to Musick was performed. In the Evening a Play was given by his Grace to the Ladies. At Night there were Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other Demonstrations of Joy throughout the City; and at the Castle, the Ball and the several Entertainments were extremely regular and magnificent.

Dublin, October 31.

This Day Ulster King of Arms, and Atholone Pursuivant of Arms, in their Coats of Arms, accompanied with the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Sheriffs of the City of Dublin, read and published his Majesty's Declaration of War against Spain, according to the Manner in such Cases accustomed, in the most publick Places within the said City.

Whereas it has been represented to His Majesty, that on Sunday Evening last, between the Hours of Six and Seven, David Patton, Esq; High Bailiff of the City of Westminster, was violently assaulted near the End of Earl's Court in Bow-street, Covent Garden, and wounded in a barbarous Manner by three Persons unknown, and robbed of a Gold-headed Cane. For the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said Crime, his Majesty is pleased to promise his most gracious Pardon to any one of them, who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

And as a farther Encouragement to such Discovery, if any Person who has been an Accomplice in the said Robbery, shall within three Months from the Day the said Robbery was committed, discover and apprehend any Offender who hath committed the said Robbery, so as such Offender be convicted of the said Offence, such Accomplice will be entitled to have and receive for every

such Offender so apprehended and convicted as aforesaid, the Sum of One hundred Pounds Sterling, mentioned in his Majesty's Royal Proclamation, over and above all other Rewards to which such Accomplice may by any Act of Parliament be entitled.
