Unmarried Daughters of Peers proceeded by Pairs, those of the Highest Degree going nearest the Petsons of the Duke and Princels. The Duke, leading the Princess in a Virgin Habit with a Coronet; conducted by the Lord-Chamberlain and Vice Chamberlain.
