Naples, May 17, N. S.

ON the 12th Instant M. Linch and M. Maclain, the Captains of the Limerick Regiment of Irith, who murdered M. Odea their Colonel, were taken out of the Convent of Monte Calvario, the Place of their Refuge, and conducted to the Castle dell' Ovo, where they are closely confined, in order to receive their Sentence. On the 13th died of the Dropsy M. de Charney, Captain-General of the King's Forces, in which Post the Duke di Castropignano succeeds him; who for this Purpose has been recalled from the King's Embassy at the French Court: In the mean time Don Nicholas de Sangro is ordered to act in his Stead.

Rome, May 21. There is yet no Prospect of a speedy Conclusion of the Conclave for the Election of a new Pope. The Albani and Corsini Factions still endeavour to carry their different Designs: the German Cardinals are now on the Side of the former: But the French and Spanish Cardinals appear to be neutral; designing 'tis supposed to reserve their casting Votes in Favour of a Person acceptable to their Courts.

Florence, May 29. They write from Leghorne, that on the 26th Instant came into that Port his Britannick Majesty's Ship the Kennington, Capt. Robinson, Commander, last from Naples. On the 24th the Primate of Lorrain and the Prince de Beaveau, Sons to the Prince Craon, returned hither from Rome, as did on the 27th the Prince and Princess Craon.

Berlin, June 7, N. S. On Sunday last his Prussian Majesty came hither from Charlottenberg, and after having assisted at Divine Service, dined in Publick for the first Time since the King his Father's Death. In the Afternoon his Prussian Majesty went back to Charlottenbourg, and this Morning he set out for Reinsberg, the Place of his usual Residence when he was Prince Royal. The late King having expressly forbid the being embalmed after his Death, the Corpse was privately carried on Saturday last to a Vault which he had caused to be made during his Life, in one of the Churches at Potzdam. The Funeral will be performed as soon as every thing can be got ready for that Ceremony, which 'tis said will be very magnificent.

Portsmouth, June 1.

This Day came in his Majesty's Ship the Deptford, Capt. Pocklington, Commander,

and brought in a Spanish Privateer called the St. Sebastian y las animas, commanded by Don Pablo de Arbez. She carried 12 Guns and 114 Men; but when taken had but 91.

Whitehall, June 6.

This Morning early Her Royal Highness the Princess of Hesse set out from St. James's with her Attendance and Retinue, and embarked at Greenwich for Holland on board his Majesty's Yacht the Mary, which sailed about Seven a-Clock with a very fair Wind.

Whitehall, May 29, 1740.

Whereas on Monday the 3d Day of March last, Richard Nicholson, late of Denton in the County of Durham, Yeoman, was attacked by two Persons unknown, between the Hours of Eight and Nine in the Evening, in the open Highway, between Darlington and Cocker-ton, in the said County, and without giving him the least Notice, one of them discharged a Pistol at him, one of the Balls whereof grazed upon his Belly, and another was shot into his Hand, of which Wounds he languished till the 31st of last Month, and then died. In order to the discovering and bringing to Punishment the Persons concerned in the said Crime, their Excellencies the Lords Justices are pleased to promise His Majesty's most gracious Pardon to any one of the Offenders (except the Person who committed the Murther) who shall discover his Accomplice or Accomplices, so as he or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.

Whereas the Post-Boy, who was carrying the Worcester Mail from London to Southall, was set upon this Morning about Four of the Clock, between Audley-street

Street End and Tyburn Turnpike, by Two Footpads, one of which was a lusty Man, in a white Cape Coat, who presented a Pistol to the said Boy, and demanding the Oxford Bag, led him into a Field against Audley-street End, opened the Mail, and took thereout the Worcester and Oxford Bags; and the Worcester Bag containing the Ludlow, Tenbury, and Bromyard Letters; the Oxford Bag containing the Burford, Whitney, and Woodstock Letters.
