Their Excellencies the Lords Justices in Council were this Day pleased to appoint John Douglas of Hever, Esq; to be Sheriff of the County of Kent, in the room of John Smith of Lee, Esq; deceased.

Naples, May 31. Sig. Finochietti, who was sent some Months ago to Constantinople, has succeeded in his Negotiation, and concluded a Treaty of Commerce between the King of the two Sicilies and the Ottoman Port, much on the same Foot as that which subsisted when these Dominions were subject to the Emperor. The two Officers of the Limerick Regiment of Iriss who murdered their Colonel, having been tried by a Court-Martial, were condemn'd, and beheaded last Week in Presence of their own as well as other Regiments, which were drawn up at the Time of the Execution.

Legborne, June 10. On the 4th Instant anchored in this Port his Britannick Majesty's Ship the Argyle, Capt. Lingen Commander, in seven Days from Port Mahon, convoying to this Port several Merchant Ships, and two Transports to take in Stores of Biscuits for the Fleet. The same Evening sailed hence his Britannick Majesty's Ship the Kennington, Capt. Robinson Commander, to cruize off Corfica. On the 8th the Prince de Beauveau set out from Florence, to take on him the Command of a Regiment lately given him by the Great Duke of Tuscany.

Berlin, June 18. Wednesday the 22d Instant is fixed for the late King's Funeral at Potzdam: The Foreign Ministers are all invited to assist at the Ceremony. Count Troughses sets out for Hanover two Days after the Funeral. This Morning M. Munchausen had a private Audience of his Prussian Majesty.

Hanover, June 22, N. S. This Day being the Anniversary of his Majesty's Succession to the Crown of Great Britain, there was a numerous and splendid Appearance at Herenhausen of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction, to compliment His Majesty on that happy Occasion; and at Night was a Play, at which the King was present, and the Duke of Brunswick, Envoy Extraordinary from the Kingdom of Prussia, and the Duke of Saxe-Weimar, Envoy Extraordinary from the Kingdom of Poland to the King

of Great Britain, who arrived here last Night from England, waited this Day on his Majesty at Herenhausen, and was graciously received.
