Petersbourg, July 8, O. S.

THE Marquês de Botta, Minister from the Emperor, had his Audience of Leave of the Czarina Yesterday, and will be setting out on his Return home the latter End of this Week or the Beginning of the next. The Princess Anne will come to Town from Petershoff about this Day Seven-night, her Reckoning being up the Beginning of August. It is expected that General Keith will set out one Day next Week for his Command in the Ukraine.

Vienna, July 30. Count Bathiani, General of Horse, and Councillor of State, is appointed to go and compliment the King of Prussia upon his Accession to the Throne.

Hanover, Aug. 9, N. S. On Sunday Night about Nine of the Clock, her Royal Highness the Princess of Hesse, and his most Serene Highness Prince Frederick her Royal Highness's Consort, arrived at Herenhausen from Cassel, where, amidst a great Concourse of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and Gentry, who were assembled there to be Spectators of the happy Interview, his Majesty was pleased to receive them with all possible Marks of Joy and Affection: Their Highnesses were accompanied from Cassel by her Highness the Princess Mary, Sister to Prince Frederick, whom his Majesty likewise received very graciously, and their Highnesses are all lodged in the Palace of Herenhausen; and Yesterday at Noon there was a very numerous and splendid Appearance of the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and Gentry at Court, to make them their Compliments.

And the Governors of the said Charity intending to distribute to the Widows of such Sea Officers who died before the 30th of August 1732, and whose Circumstances come within the Rules of the Establishment, their Share of the Bounty granted by Parliament; these are to give Notice of the same to all such Widows, that they may procure the proper Certificates and Affidavits, and send or bring them hither. And the Court of Assistants do hereby give Notice, that they will meet at this Office on Tuesday the 16th of September next, at Eight o'Clock in the Morning, to receive the Claims of such Widows as shall be qualified according to the said Rules and Orders.
