Westminster, November 18.

IS Majefty came this Day to the Houfe of Peers, and being in His Royal Robes, feated on the Throne with the ufual Solemnity, SirCharles Dalton', Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod, was fent with a Mellage from His Majesty to the House of Commons, commanding their Attendance in the House of Peers; the Commons being come thither accordingly, His Majesty was pleased to make the following most gracious Speech.

My Lords and Gentlemen, Acquainted you, at the Clole of the last Seffion of Parliament, that I was making Preparations for carrying on the just and neceffary War in which I am engaged, in the most proper Places, and in the most vigorous and effectual Manner. For this Purpofe, ftrong Squadrons were got ready, and ordered to fail upon important Services, both in the West Indies and Europe, with as much Expedition as the Nature of those Services, and the manning of the Ships; would admit : A very confiderable Body of Land Forces was embarked, which is to be joined by a great Number of my Subjects railed in America; and all Things necellary for transporting the Troops from hence, and carrying on the de-ligned Expedition, were a long Time in Rea-dinels, and waited only for an Opportunity to purfue the intended Voyage.

The leveral Incidents which have happened in the mean time, have had no Effect upon me, but to confirm me in my Refolutions, and to determine me to add Strength to my Armaments, rather than to divert or deter me from those just and vigorous Measures which I am purfuing, for maintaining the Honour of my Crown, and the undoubted

Rights of my People. The Court of Spain having already felt some Effects of our Resentment, began to be fenfible, that they should be no longer able, alone, to defend themfelves against the Efforts

of the British Nation; and if any other Power, agreeably to fome late extraordinary Proceedings, should interpose, and attempt to prescribe or limit the Operations of the War against my declared Enemies, the Honour and Interest of my Crown and Kingdoms must call upon us to lose no Time in putting ourfelves into fuch a Condition, as may enable us to repel any Infults, and to fruftrate any De-figns formed against us, in Violation of the Faith of Treaties; and I hope any fuch unprecedented Steps, under what Colour or Pretence foever they may be taken, will infpire my Allies with a true Senfe of the common Danger, and will unite us in the Support and Defence of the common Caule

The great and unhappy Event of the Death of the late Emperor, opens a new Scene in the Affairs of Europe, in which all the prin-cipal Powers may be immediately or confe-quentially concerned. It is impoffible to de-termine what Turn the Policy, Interest, or Ambition of the feveral Courts may lead them to take in this critical Conjuncture. It shall be my Care strictly to observe and attend to their Motions, and to adhere to the Engagements I am under, in order to the maintaining of the Balance of Power, and the Liberties of Europe ; and in Concert with fuch Powers as are under the fame Obligations, or equally concerned to preferve the publick Safety and Tranquility] to act fuch a Part as may best contribute to avert the imminent Dangers that may threaten them.

Gentlemen of the Houfe of Commons, I have ordered Effimates to be prepared, and laid before you, for the Service of the enfuing Year. It is always with Regret that I ask any extraordinary Aids of my People: But what I have already mentioned mult be fufficient to fatisfy you, that fome Augmen-tations will be neceffary, not only for carry-ing on the prefent War with Vigour, but alfo to put ourfelves in a Condition of being prepared for such Events as may arise in this new and uncertain State of Europe. I therefore

fore depend on your experienced Zeal and Affection for me and my Government, your Concern for your own Safety, and the Support of the common Caufe, to grant me luch effectual Supplies as may be requifite for thele great Ends.

#### My Lords and Gentlemen,

The Scarcity of Corn, which has happened in many Countries of Europe, has induced feveral Powers to make extraordinary Provifions to obviate the ill Effects of that Miffortune; and though in many Parts of this Kingdom, the Harvest has proved more favourable, yet common Prudence calls upon us to provide as far as may be against the Approach of such a Calamity. Besides, in our present Circumstances, it would be an inexcufable Neglect to fuffer our Enemies to be supplied with any Kind of Provisions from my Dominions, and that even at the Hazard of my own Subjects being diftreffed. Let me therefore earneftly recommend it to you to confider of fome good Law to prevent this growing Mifchief.

The Difficulties which have been found in manning the Fleet by the ufual Methods hitherto practised, demonstrate the Want of fome Parliamentary Remedy : I must therefore prefs it upon you to lofe no Time in making fuch Provisions in this Respect, as, whilft we are engaged in a War in Defence of the Commerce and Navigation of this Kingdom, may enable the Publick to avail itfelf of those great Numbers of Seamen, which make fo valuable a Branch of our Strength.

The Importance of these Confiderations is fo apparent, that I need use no Arguments to convince you of the Necessity of the utmost Unanimity and Dispatch in your Proceedings.

## Whitehall, November 18.

A Letter from Captain Mitchell, Commander of His Majesty's Ship the Bucking-ham, dated at Spithead the 16th Instant, gives the following Account, Sir Chaloner Ogle was on Friday the 31ft of October, 70 Leagues to the Weftward of the Start, in the Latitude of 47° 1154', having had a good Paffage down the Channel with a northerly Wind. It blew hard all that Day and the next Night; the Fleet lay to with their Heads to the Westward; our Ship labouring very much, hove away her Foreropmass, and on Sunday Morning we found the Mainmass to be forung, which we loss foon after, at which Time the Admiral made Sail to the Weftward. We loft Sight of all the Fleet that

After having confider'd the Afternoon. Distance of our Rendezvous and the Condidition of the Ship, Capt. Mitchell thought it proper to return with her to England. From the Time we loft Sight of the Fleet, we had the Wind to the oth In-ftant between the North and Eaft, and fince between the North and Weft; fo that if the Fleet have had the fame Winds, they must be got well to the Southward.
