A P R O C L A M A T I O N,

For a General Fast.

WHEREAS we have found ourselves obliged, for vindicating the Honour of our Crown, securing the Trade and Navigation of our Subjects, and defending our undoubted Rights, to declare War against the King of Spain, and are determined to prosecute the same with the utmost Vigour, till, by the Blessing of God on our Arms, we shall obtain that Satisfaction and Security which we may hope from the Justice of our Cause; We therefore, putting our Trust in the divine Assistance, have resolved, and do, by and with the Advice of our Privy Council, hereby Command, that a publick Fast and Humiliation be observed throughout that Part of our Kingdom of Great Britain called England, our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, upon Wednesday the Fourth Day of February next, that so both we and our People may humble ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon for our Sins; and may, in the most devout and solemn Manner, send our Prayers and Supplications to the divine Majesty, for averting those heavy Judgments, which our manifold Sins and Provocations have most justly deserved, and imploring his Blessing and Assistance on our Arms, and for restoring and perpetuating Peace, Safety and Prosperity to us and our Kingdoms. And we do strictly charge and command, that the said publick Fast be reverently and decently observed by all our loving Subjects in England, our Dominion of Wales, and Town of Berwick upon Tweed, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid his Wrath and Indignation; and upon Pain of such Punishment as we may justly inflict on all such as contemn and neglect the Performance of so Religious and Necessary a Duty. And for the better and more orderly solemnizing the same, we have given Directions to the most Reverend the Arch-Bishops, and the Right Reverend the Bishops

of England, to compose a Form of Prayer suitable to this Occasion, to be used in all Churches, Chapels, and Places of publick Worship; and to take care the same be timely dispersed throughout their respective Dioceses.

Given at our Court at St. James's, the Twenty Fourth Day of December, 1740, in the Fourteenth Year of our Reign.

GOD save the KING.

Berlin, Dec. 17, N. S. According to all our Accounts, the Prussian Troops were to march into Silesia as Yesterday or this Day; and if some Advices be true, they are like to meet with a little Opposition at Glogow, that Garrison having been reinforced by two or three Battallions, who are hard at Work in repairing, as well as they can, the Fortifications of that Place. It is said they have already pulled down all the Houses in the Suburbs. This Advice has determined his Prussian Majesty to order four or five Pieces more of Cannon, each of 12 Pounders, to be sent to him from hence with as much Diligence as is possible. There is scarce a Day but Troops arrive here and proceed on their March towards Silesia; and according to the Calculation that is made, when all are arrived there, his Prussian Majesty will have with him an Army of about 30000 Men.

Berlin, Dec. 20, N. S. On Friday last, the 16th Instant, the Prussian Troops made their first Entrance into Silesia. There are Letters of the 17th from Schweidnitz, a little Town on this Side of Glogow, which import, that the next will bring Accounts that his Prussian Majesty is got beyond Glogow, as he will not stop before that Town, but leave some Troops cantoon'd about it to prevent any Provisions being sent in, and so force the Garrison, which consists of 1800 Men, commanded by Lieutenant-General Wallis, to surrender through want of Subsistence. The General Rumour is, that on the 28th of this Month his Prussian Majesty will be before Breslau. The Marquess de Botta, who arrived here a few Weeks ago from Vienna, has received Orders to repair forthwith to the Court of Petersbourg. M. Bulow, the new Saxon Minister, set out suddenly two Days ago for the Army in Silesia; but whether he has undertaken this Journey by Order of his Court, or at the Desire of the King of Prussia, is yet uncertain.

St. James's, December 24.

This Day Count d'Ostein, Minister Plenipotentiary from the Queen of Hungary and Bohemia, had a private Audience of his Majesty to deliver his Letters of Credence; he was introduced by his Grace the Duke of Manchester, Lord of the Bedchamber in Waiting, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrell, Kt. Master of the Ceremonies.

Whitehall, December 26.

Yesterday being Christmas-Day, the King, with their Royal Highnesses the Duke and the three Princesses, with several of the Nobility and other Persons of Distinction, received the Holy Sacrament in the Royal Chapel at St. James's, the Communion Office being performed by the Right Reverend the Lord Bishop of London, Dean of the Chapel.

On Thursday last Orders were issued from the Lord Chamberlain's Office, for the Court's going out of Mourning on Sunday next for the late-Emperor of Germany, and for the late Czarina.
