A PROCLAMATION,

For a General Fast.

GEORGE R.

Hereas we have found ourselves obliged, VV for vindicating the Honour of our Crown, fecuring the Trade and Navigation of our Subjects, and defending our undoubted Rights, to declare War against the King of Spain, and are determined to profecute the same with the utmost Vigour, till, by the Blessing of God on our Arms, we shall obtain that Satisfaction and Security which we may hope from the Justice of our Cause; We therefore, putting our Trust in the divine Assistance, have resolved, and do, by and with the Advice of our Privy Council, hereby Command, that a publick Fast and Humiliation be observed throughout that Part of our Kingdom of Great Britain called Scotland, upon Wednelday the Fourth Day of February next, that so both we and our People may humble ourselves before Almighty God, in order to obtain Pardon for our Sins; and may, in the most devout and so-lemn Manner, send our Prayers and Supplications to the divine Majesty, for averting those heavy Judgments, which our manifold Sins and Provocations have most justly deferved, and imploring his Blessing and Assistance on our Arms, and for restoring and perpetuating Peace, Safety and Prosperity to us and our Kingdoms. And we do firically charge and command, that the said publick Fast be reverently and devoutly observed by all our loving Subjects in Scotland, as they tender the Favour of Almighty God, and would avoid his Wrath and Indignation, and upon Pain of such Punishment as we may justly inflict on all such as contemn and neglect the Performance of so Religious and Necessary a Duty. Our Will is therefore, and we charge, that incontinent this our Proclamation feen, ye pass to the Market Cross of Edinburgh, and all other Places needful, and there, in Our Name and Authority, make Publication hereof, that none pretend Ignorance. And Our Will and Pleasure is, That Our Solicitor do cause printed Copies hereof to be sent to the Sherists of the several Shires, Stewards of Stewarties, and Bailists of Regalities, and their Clerks, whom we ordain to see the same published: And we appoint them to fend Doubles hereof to the several Paroch Kirks within their Bounds, that up-on the Lord's-Day immediately preceding the Day above-mentioned, the same may be published and read from the Pulpits immediately after Divine Service.

A PROCLAMATION,

For Encouraging Seamen and able-bodied Landmen to enter themselves on board our Ships of War.

GEORGE R.

WHereas it is our Royal Intention to give due Encouragement to all such Seamen and able-bodied Landmen who shall voluntarily enter themselves in our Service, We have thought fit, by and with the Advice of our Privy Council, to publish this our Royal Proclamation; and we do hereby promise and declare, that all such Seamen not above the Age of Fifty-five, nor under the Age of Eighteen Years, fit for our Service, or able-bodied Landmen from Eighteen to Thirty Years of Age, who shall in Great Britain, Ireland, or the Islands of Guernsey or Jersey, on or before the Fisteenth Day of February next, voluntarily enter themselves to serve in our Royal Navy, either with the Captains or Lieutenants of our Ships, or the chief Officers on board fuch Tenders as shall be employed for railing Men for the Service of our Navy, or with any Justice of Peace or chief Magi-ftrate of any City or Town, shall respective-ly receive as our Royal Bounty, the respective-Sums solvening, (that is to say) Every able Seaman the Sum of Two Guineas, every ordinary Seaman the Sum of Thirty Shillings, and every able-bodied Landman the Sum of Twenty Shillings each Man; such re'pective Sums to be paid them by the Clerks of the Check, or by the Treasurer of our Navy, in Manner following, (that is to fay) If the Ships they enter into fit out in the Rivers of Thames or Medway, so soon as they get to the Nore; and if the said Ships fit out at Portsinouth, so soon as they go out to Spithead; and if the said Ships fit out at Plymouth, before they sail from Hamoaze; and if the laid Ships fit out at any other Ports, so soon as they shall arrive at the Nore, or at Spithead, or in Plymouth Sound. And we do hereby require and direct, that if any such Seaman or Landman shall voluntarily enter themselves within the Time beforementioned, with any Officer, Justice of Peace, or chief Magistrate as aforefaid, such Officer, Justice of Peace, or chief Magistrate respectively, shall give to each Man so entring, a Certificate under his Hand and Seal (without Fee or Reward) of his Entry, and the Time of fuch Entry, and shall thereby limit such Number of Days, not exceeding Ten, as may be necessary for his re-pairing on board, and in which Certificates

they are to insert the Names of the Persons so cers of our Ships, and others employed in entring, and to describe their Persons and the Impressing of Men for our Fleet, that Ages, and to mention therein the Time althey take particular Care not to impress or lowed them to repair on board our said Ships. entertain any Persons whatsoever, who shall And we do hereby declare, that such Seamen not be fitly qualified to serve in our Royal and Landmen, who on or before the faid Fif-Navy. And for preventing of any Deceits teenth Day of February next shall voluntarily or Abuses which may happen by any Person or enter themselves as aforesaid, and shall within the Time limited and appointed in fuch long, and entring him or themselves on Board their Certificates, repair on board, and remain in any of our faid Ships and Vessels, shall to obtain the Bounty-Money herein before be entitled to the Benefit of our Royal Progranted; We do hereby direct, declare, and mise as aforesaid, and not otherwise. And in command, That such Seamen and Landman such Case, every such Seaman and Landman belonging to any of our Ships or Vessels shall be entitled to his Pay from the Time of his being first entred as asoresaid. And we any of the Ships or Vessels to which they do hereby require and command all Persons shall belong, and shall enter themselves on whatfoever that may be authorized or impowered to impress Mariners for our Service, that they do not impress or molest any such Sea-men or Landmen to whom such Certificates as aforesaid shall be given, according to the true Intent and Meaning of this our Royal Proclamation; or any Man now in our Service, who by Tickets fign'd by the Captains of our Ships or Vessels to which they belong, have or shall have Leave to be absent from their Duty for any Time not exceeding Twelve Days, before which Time they shall not fail to render themselves on board our said Ships or Vessels whereto they shall belong, according to the Time limited by such their Certificates or Tickets. And to the End we may be truly informed what Persons shall so enter and render themselves to serve on board our Royal Navy, in pursuance of this our Royal Proclamation, We do hereby require and command our respective Captains, Lieutenants and chief Officers commanding any of our Ships of War, or other our Ships or Vessels asoresaid, and also all Justices of the Peace the said Fisteenth Day of February be found and chief Magistrates within Great Britain, Ireland, and the Islands of Guernsey and Jersey, to transmit to the Principal Officers and Commissioners of our Navy, exact Lists and Accounts of the Names, Ages, and Descriptions of the Persons who shall voluntarily enter themselves with them, and the Times when and Places where, and of the Times which shall be allowed them respectively for rendring themselves on board, and of the Times of their respective repairing on board any of our said Ships or Vessels. And we do require and command the said Seamen to repair on board their respective Ships or Vessels on which they shall so enter themselves, or to which they shall belong, within the Times limited by such Certificates or Tickets, on Pain of our highest Displeasure. And we are graciously pleased to declare, That Conduct-Money, according to the Practice of the Navy, shall be allowed to all fuch Seamen and Landmen fo voluntarily entring and rendring themselves on Board, according to the true Meaning of this our Royal Proclamation. And we do here-by farther declare, That if such Men in our said Service, who are or shall be permitted to be absent by such Tickets as aforesaid, do not repair on Board their respective Ships or Vessels by the Time allowed by such Tickets, they shall not only be liable to be impressed, but to suffer such farther Punishment as by Law may be inflicted on them for fuch their Neglect. And we do hereby also That in all Protections the Persons be not strictly command all the Captains and Offi-

Persons leaving the Ships to which they beany other of our Ships as aforesaid, in order belonging to any of our Ships or Vessels whatsoever, as shall absent themselves from Board any other of our Ships or Vessels in order to obtain the faid Bounty-Money, shall not only lose the Wages due to them in the Ships they shall so leave, but also be severely punished according to their Demerits. And whereas it has been often found, that in Time of War great Numbers of Seamen, and also of Watermen, Bargemen and Light-ermen fit for our Sea Service, have lest the usual Places of their Abode, and have removed themselves into private and obscure Places, endeavouring thereby to avoid the publick Service, when there is the greatest Occasion for them: We do hereby require and command all our Justices of the Peace, Mayors, Bailiss, Magistrates, Constables and other Officers, that they not only give all necessary Assistance to our Officers employed in impressing as aforesaid, but that they do use their utmost Endeavours to discover, secure, and fend to fome near Sea-port Town, all fuch Seamen, Watermen, Bargemen and Lightermen fit for our Service, as shall after so absconding or stragling Abroad from their usual Places of Abode, and more especially in the Roads from any Sea-port Towns to London, in order to their being put on Board our Fleet in our Service, and that of what they shall do therein, they from Time to Time send an Account to the Commissioners of our Navy. And we do hereby direct the respective Officers of our Fleet, who shall receive such Seamen, Watermen, Bargemen and Lightermen, to give Receipts for them, therein expressing the Names of such Men, and on Board what Ship or Vessel, and the Time when and Place where they are received. And the Commissioners of our Navy are hereby directed, upon producing (at any Port where there are Officers immediately under their Directions) the faid Receipts, to pay to the Person producing the same, Twenty Shillings for each Man, and Sixpence per Man for each Mile he shall be. brought if under Twenty Miles, and Ten Shillings for each Man that shall be brought above Twenty Miles, over and besides the faid Twenty Shillings. And we do hereby declare, That no Protection of any Man in any Ships or Vessels employed in the River or on the Coast by the Commissioners of our Navy, Ordnance, Victualling and Customs, shall be in Force for more than Six Months from the Date thereof (except such as shall be figned by our Lord's Conmissioners of our Admiralty.) And we farther direct, only named, but described by their Place

for which they are protected: And that any of them who shall be found upon the Water in any other Service than what they were protected for, shall lose the Benefit of their Protection, (except the Watermen belonging to us and our Royal Family, the Admiralty, Navy, Victualling, Ordnance and Customs.) And we do hereby require and command our they do on or before the faid Fifteenth Day Commissioners of our Navy, Ordnance, Vic- of February next, render themselves on board tualling and Customs, that they do not protect more Men than their Service absolutely requires; and to renew all their Protections our Royal Navy. And as a farther Encouwithin their Reach by the End of the faid ragement to them to return to their Duty, Time limited for Bounty-Money; and to revoke all Protections by them or any of them granted respectively, so soon as the Service is over for which the same respectively were or shall be granted. And for encouraging Persons to discover Seamen, Watermen, Lightermen and Bargemen, who shall abscond or secrete themselves as aforefaid; We do hereby promise and declare, That for every such Man, who after the said Fifteenth Day of February next shall be difcovered and brought on Board any of our Ships of War or Tenders for the Receipt of Seamen, the Person so discovering them, shall receive the Sum of Two Guineas for every able Seaman, and Thirty Shillings for every ordinary Seaman, from our Commissioners of our Navy, or the Naval Officers at the Port where he shall be brought; or if there shall be no Naval Officer, from the Collector of the Cuftoms there. And whereas we are informed, that great Numbers of Mariners and Seafaring Men, our natural-born Subjects, are in the Service of divers Foreign Princes and States, to the Prejudice of our Kingdom; We do therefore hereby strictly charge and command all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mari-ners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seasaring Men whatfoever and wherefoever, (being our natural born Subjects) who are in the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or do serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel, that forthwith they and every of them do (according to their known and bounden Duty and Allegiance) withdraw themselves, depart from, and quit such Foreign Services, and return home to their native Countries. we do hereby strictly prohibit and forbid all Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, and other Seafaring Men whatfoever (being our natural born Subjects) from entring, and do charge and command them and every of them, from henceforth to forbear to enter themselves into the Pay or Service of any Foreign Prince or State, or to serve in any Foreign Ship or Vessel whatsoever, without our special Licence first had and obtained in that Behalf, to all which we expect due Obedience and exact Conformity. we do hereby publish and declare, that the Offenders to the contrary shall not only incur our just Displeasure, but be proceeded against for their Contempt according to the utmost Severities of the Law. And we do hereby declare, that if any such Masters of Ships, Pilots, Mariners, Seamen, Shipwrights, or other Seafaring Men (being our Subjects) shall be taken in any Foreign Service by the Turks, Algerines, or any others, they shall not be the Princess of Wales was safely delivered of reclaimed by us as Subjects of Great Britain. a Princess.

of Residence and Employment, and Service And whereas divers Mariners and Seafaring Men have deserted our Service, We being unwilling to proceed to the utmost Severity of Law, in case they shall return to their Duty, are graciously pleased by this our Royal Pro-clamation to declare, that we shall and do hereby pardon all fuch Mariners or Seafaring Men who have deserted our Service, provided any of our Ships of War, or Tenders employed in impressing or taking in Men for manning We do likewise hereby most graciously promile, upon their rendring themselves as aforefaid, the R fet against their Names in the Ships Books shall be taken off and their Wages paid them. But in case any such Deserters shall not accept of this our gracious Offer, and render themselves within the Time aforesaid, they shall be seized wherever they can be found, and tried before a Court Martial, and upon Condemnation suffer Death as Deferters, without any Hopes of Pardon.
